Distinguished Visitor Here Yesterday

Hjalmar Nilsson, chief inspector of the state of Minnesota, arrived in Tulsa Tuesday evening and remained until last night, conferring with some of our leading refiners and looking over the situation. Mr. Nilsson came here by way of Oklahoma where he inspected the Lake Park refinery, and at Sapulpa where he visited the Sapulpa Refining Company plants. He expressed his regret at not having sufficient time to visit Tulsa's half dozen magnificent refineries, but stated that he intended to return to Tulsa some time in May and would remain one month in order to do the refining industry here justice.

Mr. Nilsson has just returned from Washington, D. C., where he attended a meeting of the directors of the Bureau of Mines, and was in conference with the committee on specifications. The new state law of Minnesota, which went into effect the past year, providing for a distillation test which is the only quality test for motor gasoline in that state, was thoroughly explained by Mr. Nilsson, who pointed out the good work that has been performed since this law went into effect.

Gravity no longer cuts any figure in the quality of motor gasoline, says Mr. Nilsson, since such gravity test has been out-dated by the many blended products now on the market.

The meeting at Washington was in charge of F. G. Cottrell, director of the Bureau of Mines, with G. W. Gray, chairman of the technical

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Paul Konz Discusses the Situation

Paul Konz has just returned to Tulsa after five weeks in New York City, and is very enthusiastic about conditions generally. He stated that the financial situation is improving nicely—and that a very general improvement is probable immediately following the election. Regarding the election he states that he can see very little change from conditions of the past several weeks, despite the democratic claims of eleventh hour change of sentiment.

Election odds in New York are 6 to 1 on Harding and Cox supporters are asking 7 and 8 to 1. It is the opinion of Mr. Konz that New York City and state will go for Harding by good plurality—also New Jersey. The trend in New Jersey is very interesting due to the change there. The last election went so overwhelmingly for Democratic Governor Edward, and now will give the same overwhelming returns for Harding.

Mr. Konz returned by way of Fort Worth, where he went to attend the annual meeting of the Carter Oil Company. This is the company organized by Pat Powers and Paul Konz and finishing up its first year with several hundred barrels production and several wells drilling in Breckenridge district.

Lou Ladd and Ed Hannon have charge of the active management of the company and are very heavy stockholders. All of this is good news regarding these former Tulsa men whom we would like to see back permanently. Mr. Ladd is expected next week, intending to stay several days. Mr. Hannon is expected to come up later as they have some attractive holdings needing personal inspection.

Showing the political trend Mr. Konz remarked that he had enough the entire board of directors of their corporation at the annual meeting evidenced intention of voting for Harding. The New Jersey directors, of which there are five, are all life-long democrats. Pat Powers, well-known operator, James Kierman, millionaire paperbox manufacturer; Louis Schuchman, millionaire chocolate manufacturer; John Hansen, wholesale fish dealer, called the "Crab Meat King," because of the immense extent of his fisheries and plants; also Judge Frank Higgins, counselor, are the five mentioned; all men of wealth and responsibility. This should be a criterion as to how New Jersey would go on the election.

Mr. Konz smiles as he mentions having drilled a couple of dry holes lately, however, adds that he is sure more tests in east Kansas, where he expects some shallow production.

Queens-Barnes Well Showing Up Fine

The Owen Queens-Barnes well in the southeast corner of the southwest of 24-16-10, has made one flow over the top of the rig and is standing full of oil at 2,630 feet, according to reports from there yesterday.

This producer is almost two and one-half miles from production, the closest wells being the Harner et al. producers in 2-24. It also opens up a brand-new pool and is being watched with interest.

Top of the Dutchman was found a day or so ago at 2,595 feet, and after three feet of it, during which the well filled up 1,500 feet with oil, a 30-foot layer of shale was encountered. Ten more feet of oil bearing sand was found and the well filled up 2,000 feet with oil.

They are now drilling on top of a lime shell, after six feet more of shale, and it is the company's opinion that the real pay lies underneath this shell. They are building tankage in hopes of a big producer.

New Test at Holdenville

The Sapulpa Refining Company has contracted with C. A. Silva to drill a test well for oil in the southwest corner of the northeast quarter of 2-24-10. The well is now being drilled and will be in a few days. The Kewanee Oil and Gas company is studded in a well at this location.

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Irwin-Davis Have Showing

Irwin & Davis is reported to have a showing of gas and the well filled up about 300 feet with oil in No. 1 Jefferson, located at the center of the north line of the northwest of 24-14-11, southwest of Phillipsville. The company has been badly tied up with fishing jobs and savings of late, but the well is now looking like a producer.

John Rebold Nearing Pay

John H. Rebold is on top of the Wilcox sand and will drill in today on his No. 1 Washington allotment in the southeast corner of the southwest of 15-14-11.

Turman Getting Another

The Thurman Oil company is drilling in a good one today on its Thompson farm lease, being the center location of the southeast of the northwest of 20-15-11. The well is reported to be flowing at the rate of 50 barrels per hour at but a few feet in the pay topped at 2,430 feet. The company is still drilling.

Sequoyah Nearing Pay Good One

The Sequoyah Oil company is drilling at 2,550 feet and expects to get three pay within a day or so. Its No. 2 Grayson, in the southeast corner of the northwest of the southwest of 17-14-12. The company had a small showing in the Dutchman topped at 2,425 feet.

Another Texas Gusher for Oklahoma P. & R.

Oklahoma Producing & Refining Corporation of America and the P. & R. Oil company have completed No. 5 well on the I. A. Sloan, which is a 180-acre tract in sections 2 and 4, Lunatic asylum survey, about one and one-half miles north of Breckenridge, Stephens county, Texas. The well started off with an initial production of 2,000 barrels a day at 17 feet in the line, which was struck at 3,140. The well is flowing natural. The Sloan lease now is producing between 3,500 and 4,000 barrels daily, and three additional wells are expected to be completed within the next ten days or two weeks.

The O. P. & R. also has completed its No. 10 well in the northeast quarter of 19-22-10 with an initial production estimated at 75 barrels. This well was given a shot of 160 quarts and was drilled to a total depth of 1,840 feet. The well was shot from 1,771 to 1,795. The No. 10 in an inside location on the discovery tract of a pool that has developed some of the largest complications ever recorded in the Osage.

The company's wildest well in the northwest corner of the southeast quarter of 16-24-7, is reported to be shut down with a showing of oil at 2,850 feet, being 25 feet in the sand.

A late report from the O. P. & R. properties in Woodson county, Kan., announces a 30-barrel completion in the No. 5 on the James Dye farm. This well is in the southwest corner of the southwest quarter of 7-24-14. The company has developed a substantial production in this district, where it owns an immense amount of acreage.

The company's net production so far this year has averaged several hundred barrels a day higher than 1919, which was a highly prosperous year for O. P. & R.

Wetzelka District

The North American Fiscal corporation has a 20-barrel well in the Wiley Ben farm in the center of the northeast of the northwest of the northwest of 15-10-11.

The Henry Oil company is shut down at 2,000 feet with a hole full of water on their McIntosh farm test in the southeast of the northwest of the northwest of 12-11-10.

West of Okmulgee

The Butts Oil & Gas has a 4,000-gallon gusher and shut down at 2,371 feet on their Kay Thomas farm No. 1 center of the south line southeast of southwest 32-13-11.

The Gladys Belle Oil company has a 50-barrel showing at 2,107 feet in their Williams farm No. 4 center south line northeast of the northeast of 3-13-12.

Rebold's No. 1 on the Williams farm, center of the east line northwest of the northeast of 24-13-12, is holding up at 153 barrels in the 1,992-foot sand.

Grain Exports Decline. WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Exports of grain and flour fell off more than a million dollars during September, as compared with August, the department of commerce reported today. Total value of such exports for the month were placed at \$114,604,731 which, however, represents an increase of approximately \$25,000,000 over September, 1919. Cotton exported in September amounted to 228,088 bales, valued at \$41,441,660 as compared with 146,668 bales, worth \$28,051,051 in August.

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
