

GIRL STRAYS OFF COPS CALLED OUT

Three-Year-Old Pauline Jefferson Vanishes, but Is Found.

FOUND A WONDERLAND

Attracted by Displays, Strays From Mother's Side; Crowds Gather.

"Someone has kidnaped my child." With those words upon her lips, Mrs. B. Jefferson, assistant housekeeper at Oklahoma hospital, rushed into the Wasserman jewelry store at Third and Main at 6 o'clock last night, tears streaming from her face.

Second later she swooned, but was caught in the arms of Jack Gelfand, employe at the Wasserman store. Aroused by the import of her words Gelfand and others administered first aid. Then Gelfand called the police station for an officer, who arrived quickly. To them Mrs. Jefferson sobbed out her story.

Daughter Disappears. With her little daughter Pauline, 3 years old, she was waiting at Third and Main for a street car. An acquaintance stopped and they engaged in conversation. Five minutes passed and the conversation ended. Mrs. Jefferson reached down to take Pauline's hand—but it was not there. She glanced down. Pauline was gone. The mother, instantly responsive, looked quickly along the intersecting streets, but because of the crowds at that hour she could see only a short distance. Pauline was not in sight.

Stories of kidnapings flashed through the mother's mind—stories that told of the brutal treatment accorded kidnaped children. Frantically she ran to the edge of the sidewalk and looked in every direction. No sight of her little daughter rewarded her.

It was then she broke into tears, rushed into the store and related her story. Gelfand and the others, strangers to her, were at first bewildered but lost no time in acting.

Police Start Search. The first policeman had immediately started a search. A second officer had arrived meanwhile, and was hurriedly jotting down Mrs. Jefferson's name and address and a description of the child. He had barely finished when the first policeman returned from East Third street, leading a winsome little red-haired miss who apparently knew nothing of the excitement she had caused.

Then the truth developed. Pauline, while her mother was engaged in conversation, had turned her eyes toward the jewelry display. She walked to the opposite window, not wishing to miss any of the dazzling display. Finishing her inspection of that window she next turned a tempting lot of candy in a confectionery store.

Pauline Finds a Wonderland. It was just one astonishing sight after another to her little eyes. Other stores were also decorated tastefully—and in some cases appetizingly—and little Pauline became so absorbed in the wonderland that she did not realize how far she had gone.

When she wanted to return she found herself lost. But she didn't cry. There were so many people and so many display windows filled with pretty things that interest repressed the tears.

Then the policeman arrived. He took her hand, explaining that her mother wanted to see her. Pauline, at first reluctant, finally consented to return.

It was a happy reunion on the mother's part, although Pauline looked on uninterested in proceedings. She wanted to see some more window displays. And it was a happy mother, tears still glistening upon her cheeks, that took the little tot by the hand and led her away, unmindful of the crowd that had gathered to assist in what it had expected would be a city-wide search and the apprehension of a plotting criminal.

ARMY MAN TELLS OF HOME'S PLAN

Says Most Girls "Fall" in Early Years; To Begin Work Here Soon.

"It may surprise you, but 85 per cent of the girls that have strayed from the paths of virtue and who come to us for assistance are from 16 to 17 years old," said Lieut. Col. Geo. Wood, divisional commander of the Salvation Army, with headquarters at Dallas, while in Tulsa yesterday.

"Some of them are only 13 and 14 years old, while I remember one who was 12 years old. And, according to figures we have compiled, about 89 per cent of the girls who are in our care temporarily and who later leave to take up positions, return to the straight path and lead good lives. We know, for we have checked them after they left us. In most cases this check is continued for three years. We do not cease our vigil when the girl leaves our hospital. We continue to help her as long as she needs help. A girls' boarding house, such as we contemplate in Tulsa, is a preventive measure.
