

MAKE LAND HOLY URGES TEACHER

Protection of Soil Only

Speaker Asserts

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Nov. 5.—"Make the land holy," said Dr. H. W. Lewis, president of the Northern Industrial and National School of Aeronautics, S. D., in an address before the eleventh annual convention of the Northeastern Oklahoma Education Association here today. "The work of devastation already going on in the soil, we realize that the land is holy and should be kept so," he continued.

DRYED EGGS KEEP WELL

Alaskan Natives Gather Gulf Eggs and Dry Them in the Sun.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Eggs are dried by Alaska natives during the winter period, according to C. H. Light of Anchorage, Alaska, who is one of the holders of extensive oil acres in the Machan fields and who was a visitor to the chamber of commerce here today. And the eggs are dried are those of sea gulls. These eggs are gathered during the laying period of the birds, when it is known they are relatively fresh. The natives select a few of the rock

and break the eggs on it, leaving them alone until the sun dries them. When of a sufficient dryness, the eggs are then gathered up and put away for use in the winter.

The eggs of the gull are even superior to our common hen eggs, says Mr. Lohr. They are larger than those of the duck or turkey, although the yolks are about the same size as those of the hen eggs. The white portions are far greater. One of the eggs is worth approximately as much as three hen eggs for cooking purposes. When the eggs are dried, they may be restored to almost their first freshness and condition by soaking them in water, and

then they may be beaten or used in any other manner, the same as fresh eggs.
