

ALL AMENDMENTS
ARE VOTED DOWNTulsa County Is Against
State School Levy and
for Chiropractors

Tulsa county voters gave a majority of 2,497 in favor of vetoing the proposed state school levy, and a majority of 2,497 in favor of vetoing the proposed amendment to the constitution relative to the regulation of the practice of chiropractic.

considered as practicing medicine; provides that any person claiming to practice by any drugless system of healing must show an attendance upon a reputable college for a period of 27 months and pass examinations in certain subjects before a license will be granted. Such license, when issued to entitle the holder to practice drugless practice only.

Voters in Tulsa county, by their vote in favor of vetoing the measure, were not willing that the state medical examining board, although under the bill to have as one member a regularly licensed chiropractor, should have jurisdiction over practitioners of drugless healing.

By a decided majority the voters also showed their disapproval of the proposition outlined in bill No. 109, whereby it was sought, by section 9-A, article 10, of the constitution, to provide for levying upon all property within the state of Oklahoma not exempt from taxation, an annual tax of not less than 6 mills and not more than 10 mills, for the maintenance of the common schools of the state and provides for the

collection, apportionment and distribution of these taxes.

This bill if passed, would mean a great annual loss of school funds to the wealthier counties of the state and Tulsa county voted the proposition down by a large majority.

State question No. 99, relative to the proposition of levying upon the property of general public service corporations of the state, operating in more than one county, an annual

tax for the maintenance of the common schools, was defeated in the county by a vote of 10,331 against 6,952, majority 4,269.

Propositions No. 111 and 112 relating to authorization of the state to provide for certain classes of insurance organizations conducted without profit, and relative to the payment of the state legislators the sum of \$6 per day for their services during the 90 actual working days

of the legislature and ten cents a mile expenses, were also defeated by majorities of 1,771 and 958 respectively.
