**Writes on Thrift.**  
Mrs. Lois Clark Pearson of 1340 South Newell Avenue has as their holiday guests, Mrs. Wallace's brothers, Mr. Kenneth Wallace of Denver and Mr. Edward McCabe Jr. of New York city.

"Thrift may be an amusing subject for the first letter after Christmas, but is it not an appropriate one for the beginning of the new year?"

"Monday, January 16, has been designated by the state superintendent of public instruction as thrift day. The children in the public schools will be asked to buy two saving stamps. I think I can hear hundreds of children exclaiming 'How I want those two saving stamps.' It's thrift day. I see I need quickly produce the quarter and as my own small son says 'That's the end of it.' A thrift stamp bought with money he neither saved nor earned has small value to the child. Unless thrift day is the beginning of a year of careful teaching we have but wasted a day."

"Thrift does not mean hoarding. It means systematic saving for emergencies and the wise investment of those savings. It means judicious spending and the elimination of waste. That it has become necessary for the government to appeal to us to budget our expenses and pay them off is a universal of order that is not complimentary to the character of the American people. The general federation promised active co-operation with the government in its thrift program. I trust we will not only preach but practice." Mrs. G. A. Brown, Blackwell, is chairman and Mrs. Henry M. Carr, Pauline Valley, vice chairman of the thrift committee. They will furnish information regarding the budget system and other suggestions.
