Voters will register tomorrow their sentiment toward the 10-mill school levy. H. O. McClure, president of the board of education, said yesterday concerning the measure upon which Tulsaans will ballot tomorrow.

"As I am in favor of the 10-mill school tax levy, I am sure that the voters will be in favor of it. It is a great deal better than the 5-mill levy which we have now. It will give us the money we need to build a new school building and to pay the salaries of our teachers. It will also give us the money we need to pay the interest on our bonds. It is a very reasonable and just measure, and I am sure that the voters will support it."

As a member of the board of education, and chairman of the financial committee of the organization, I am particularly interested in the maintenance of our present high standard of education. I am very much in favor of the 10-mill school tax levy, as I know every citizen and particularly those who have young people in the schools will be."

COURT BELIEVES MEN OWNED STILL

Story of the Defendants Failed to Impress; Held for Trial

Believing W. A. Bidler and G. C. Redmond to have been the men in charge of a still found by Sand Springs constables in a small house on the east of this station last Monday afternoon, the defendants were committed to jail Saturday at the conclusion of their preliminary hearing before J. I. Valley, United States commissioner, under bonds of \$1,500 for each of the federal grand jury. The defendants testified they were walking past the house when the officers arrested them and accused both of operating a still found in the basement of the abandoned dwelling.

Testimony showed the officers saw Redmond standing near the house just prior to a raid made on the place under authority of a search warrant, and that after they surrounded the house they saw the two men walking away. They admitted they did not see these defendants in the house at any time, but indicated that there were no other persons present and when the basement of the house was searched a warm still was found, two barrels of mash and about one gallon of corn liquor in a bottle.

Bidler said he and Redmond were searching for a man living west of Tulsa known to the former as Tom Hays and that they were on their way to Hays' house when arrested.

Fate of Employment Bureau in Hands of Solons, Chief Finds

Unless additional appropriation is made by the legislature, the Tulsa free employment bureau will be necessarily discontinued, according to a message received Saturday by The World from Claude before carries total amount of labor. Typically states there is a movement on foot to abolish the Tulsa office entirely.

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
