## Lowe-Campbell Five Defeats Alva Rangers by 49-35 Score

Southwestern of Kansas Beats Des Moines Cagers

### NEVADA IS ELIMINATED

Kansas City Athletic Club Is Victor Over Conquerors of Tulsa University

KANSAS CITY, March 10.—The end of the third round of elimination play in the National Amateur Athletic Union basketball tournament here tonight found the Atlanta, Ga. Athletic club; Kansas City A. C. and Lowe-Campbell of Winfield, Kan., and Lowe-Campbell of Kansas City, the only remaining contenders for the championship.

The four teams will meet tomorrow night in semi-finals, the two Kansas City teams being pitted against each other.

**Best Play of Tonight.**  
Tonight's play was the best of the tournament so far with the contest between the Atlanta club and the Los Angeles A. C. the outstanding one in point of interest. The southern team eliminated their western opponents 21 to 20, in a game that was hard fought from start to finish. At the conclusion, the Atlanta players engaged in a wild demonstration during which the men in their jubilation, exchanged kisses.

The largest score of the evening came in the opening game when the Southwestern college of Winfield, Kan., swept the speedy Des Moines athletic five off their feet and romped through with a 41 to 12 victory. The play of the Kansas five has been one of the features of the tournament, in the opinion of many observers.

The University of Nevada went out of the competition before the Kansas City Athletic club, thought by many to be the strongest contender for the title. The score was 40 to 19, the local club displaying faster foot work and better skill in difficult situations than the Nevada squad.

In the final game of the night Lowe-Campbell retained its right to contest in the semi-finals by defeating the Northwestern State Normal, Alva, Okla., by a 49 to 35 score.
