

BRIBES ADMITTED BY TWO DEPUTIES

They Took \$10,000 From Swindler to Release Him, They Confess

LOS ANGELES, April 7.—Walter Tapes, former deputy sheriff, accused with W. J. Anderson, also formerly a deputy sheriff, of having accepted a \$10,000 bribe from Joe Furey, notorious bunco swindler, confessed a few hours after he was arrested several weeks ago, District Attorney Woolwine announced for the first time today.

The startling disclosure of Lips' expected confession was totally unexpected and placed the case of the two former officers in an entirely new light.

Woolwine also announced that discovered from his office had developed what the district attorney declared was incriminating evidence in a safe deposit of Anderson.

This included, it was stated, \$2,100 in bills bearing the signatures of banks from which it is alleged, Mrs. Furey, wife of the bunco man, took \$10,000 to give to the former officers for her husband's release. These wrappers bore a date stamp at which Mrs. Furey said she took the money from the bank. Lips and Anderson pleaded not guilty to the indictment and are now awaiting trial. They have retained attorneys and are preparing to fight the charges. They are accused of having arrested Furey, who is now in a Texas penitentiary, at his home at Glendale, and having released him in San Francisco last summer when he gave them \$10,000. Furey was recently convicted at Fort Worth on a bunco swindling charge.

HERRICK PARIS ENVOY

Ambassador Who Served Under the Taft Administration Decides to Accept the Berth.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Myron T. Herrick has decided to accept appointment as American ambassador to France, a post he filled under President Taft and which he occupied at the beginning of the world war.

Mr. Herrick's formal nomination will be made soon and he will go to France in the early summer.

Mr. Herrick, it is understood, was offered the post some time ago by President Harding, but, his friends say, was reluctant to accept it because he felt he should devote the remainder of his life to personal affairs.

Since he left the diplomatic service, Mr. Herrick has sustained personal misfortunes which include the death of his wife and a grandson, and more recently was ill himself and went to the Hawaiian islands in search of health. The principal trouble was an infection in one of his eyes which, however, has now been cleared up. Besides that, Mr. Herrick's friends point out, he has become interested in business ventures, which he felt demanded his attention.

Mr. Herrick will find himself confronted with personally paying the rent for his embassy building unless

some way can be found to meet the expenses out of other funds of the state department. One of the provisions of the last diplomatic appropriation bill cut off that expenditure. This was one of the drawbacks to securing Mr. Herrick's acceptance, it was said, because contrary to popular belief he is not a wealthy man.


