17,000 Draft Evaders In 6th Army Corps District, List Shows

CHICAGO, May 1.—The first official list of draft evaders in the sixth army corps area, embracing Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, has been received at Fort Sheridan, it was announced today.

The names will be printed and sent out to newspapers, postoffice draft boards, county sheriffs and chiefs of police. A reward of \$25 will be offered for the capture of each man named on the list.

It is proposed to publish the list in small daily installments so that there will be ample time to investigate a certain number of names per day.

Negroes Face Trial Again. HELENA, Ark., May 1.—Six negroes convicted of murder in the first degree in connection with the insurrection at Elaine in October, 1919, will have to face a third trial during the next term of the Phillips county circuit court. They were twice sentenced to death but each time the verdict was reversed. Six other negroes who were found guilty of the same charge will be executed June 10 unless their sentences are commuted.
