### SO. PACIFIC CUTS FREIGHT CHARGES

#### Rates on Rice, Barley, Canned Goods, Fruits to Be Reduced

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—The Southern Pacific company has decided to reduce freight rates on rice, barley, canned goods, dried fruits, fresh beans and dried peas. From California points to Galveston and New Orleans for export to Europe, it was announced today by the company. The reductions range from 15 per cent on rice to 44 per cent on dried fruits in boxes, the average being 32 per cent.

### 2 DIE, 12 HURT, IN BOMB BLAST

#### Explosive Drops From an Airplane; Both of Dead Enlisted Men

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Two enlisted men were killed outright, two officers and another enlisted man injured, perhaps fatally, and nine others, including one officer, were more or less seriously hurt in the explosion of a bomb in an airplane at Aberdeen, Md., army proving grounds today, according to latest reports to the war department.

Reports to the war department said the bomb was dropped as it was aloft on the ship and exploded with great force. Two of the officers injured were Capt. Joseph E. Hall and first Lieut. Lewis P. Reese. The name of a third was given in a preceding dispatch but there are several officers of the same name and it was withheld in full identity had been fully established.

BALTIMORE, May 31.—The bomb which exploded at the Aberdeen proving grounds today with serious results was being taken up in an airplane when the accident occurred, an officer at the proving grounds said over the telephone. As the machine started to ascend the bomb fell from its fastenings. The three injured officers were in the plane, he said, but could give no further details when the foregoing information was obtained.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—President Harding is understood to have reached a definite decision in regard to practically the entire membership of the shipping board, and nominations for the seven places on the board may go to the senate before the end of the week.

### Ames' Funeral Held Where He Was Wcd Just Two Months Ago

WASHINGTON, May 31.—In the same church where he was married two months ago, funeral services were held today for Lieut. Stanley Ames, pilot of the ill-fated army plane which crashed near Indian Head, Md., Saturday night, killing seven passengers.

### O'NEIL' GUARD INSTRUCTOR

#### Veteran of 90th Division Is Named for Post

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 31.—Colonel Joseph P. O'Neil, known to every Oklahoma service man who fought with the 90th division overseas as Brigadier General "Pat" O'Neil, has been detailed as instructor for the Oklahoma national guards with headquarters at Oklahoma City. Orders to this effect were received from the war department today by Governor Robertson, who placed his "O. K." on the papers and returned them at once.

Colonel O'Neil has been instructor for the Pennsylvania national guard. During the war, as a brigadier general, Colonel O'Neil had command of a brigade in the 90th division, composed of Oklahoma and Texas national army men.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 31.—Grocery stores will be allowed to remain open until 10 o'clock Sunday morning, according to an order issued Tuesday by J. M. Adair, state commissioner of police and fire. Because of numerous complaints regarding the police department's policy of closing grocery stores and from citizens, it had almost been decided to enforce the closing ordinance passed eight years ago, but to give this month's grocery dealers the 10 o'clock closing order was issued.
