BASEMENTS FLOODED

1.51 Inches of Rain Fell During a Half-Hour Period, Amounted to Almost a Cloudburst

For 30 minutes Wednesday morning, starting about 9 o'clock, residents of Tulsa feared that the flood that visited Pueblo and other Colorado cities had transferred its operations to Tulsa. For the rain here was almost equal to a cloudburst. It started without warning and quit in the same manner. During the half-hour period 1.51 inches of rain fell. Do-d-rats! were driven from the streets even though they possessed protection against rain, because of the torrential activities of the downpour, and the fact that crossing the streets was like wading a shallow river.

In many streets the water overflowed the curbs and ran over the sidewalks. This was especially true in the business district where the streets were flooded to the extent of the grade. On First street the water came up on the sidewalks and entered the front doors of several business houses.

Basements were flooded because of the inability of the storm sewers to care for the sudden onrush of water, which did not disappear for 15 or 20 minutes after the rain ceased.

It was one of the most intense rains that ever visited Tulsa. Aside from flooded basements, virtually no damage was reported as a result.
