Silent Gun Will Shoot 5 Tons 300 Miles at 5 Miles a Second

From The New York Times of Wednesday. A new gun, with a velocity ranging from one to five miles a second, which may be developed to hurl a projectile of five tons from 200 to 300 miles, was demonstrated yesterday afternoon in the tower of the Woolworth building by Dr. Miller Reese Hutchinson, former chief engineer to Thomas A. Edison...

to fire the charge. The interior of the cylinder contained the secret. The cylinder was placed in a holder built on almost the identical plan of a pneumatic hammer, with a handle at one end. In piercing the boiler plate Dr. Hutchinson stamped directly over the gun and passed the muzzle to the sheet of steel at a point not more than six inches from his feet. At his right elbow sat Hudson Maxim, inventor of smokeless powder...

"In quite close enough," said the invited members, while the others in the room held their breath in suspense. When Dr. Hutchinson let go, it was difficult for the silence-trained ear of Mr. Maxim to detect the report. He was asked afterward what he thought of the gun, and admitted that it was a remarkable demonstration. Mr. Maxim received from Mr. Hutchinson an explanation that the report was eliminated by the confinement of the expanding gases to the chamber from which the projectile had been ejected. Some kind of ingenious equipment permitted the discharge of the gases, which made a noise like a prolonged hiss...

Mr. Maxim admitted, however, that he did not foresee any great possibilities for the gun as a weapon of war. He did, however, think it would find innumerable usages in the industrial art. The weapon was the invention of John Temple, a British subject, who discovered the principle in 1915, and really developed it after coming to the United States later on. He first came to this country in 1888, and returned to his native country at the beginning of the war, when he had an opportunity to study practically every type of gun used by the allies.

First Made Pneumatic Tools. For years he had been at work developing pneumatic tools manufactured essentially by the Ingersoll-Rand company, among them being the Temple-Ingersoll electric rock drills and tools of various descriptions. The perfection of his remarkable gun was brought to the attention of William L. Saunders, chairman of the board of that corporation, who, during the war, was head of the naval consulting board. It which, for a time, were submitted to the inventor as offered for possible use against the Germans...

Mr. Saunders was impressed with the idea worked out by Mr. Temple and referred him to Dr. Hutchinson, who also was connected with the navy consulting board. Dr. Hutchinson interested himself in the invention with the belief that its possibilities as a tool of construction ultimately would prove to be of more importance than its powers for destruction.

The weapon was demonstrated in the office of Dr. Hutchinson at the gathering of inventors and newspaper men, brought together by the announcement of the formation of the Miller, Reese Hutchinson, Inc., recently organized under New Hampshire charter. This is an organization of inventors, engineers, scientists and others who promise to invent...

HEALTH AID IS ASKED

Tulsaans Can Assist in Cleaning Up City by Reporting Substances

There are a number of ways in which the public can substantially help the health department and increase the efficiency, P. L. Lind, assistant superintendent of health, said yesterday. This applies especially to the reporting of stagnant pools and other nuisances on vacant property. He said several complaints have been received regarding these pools, which have been numerous since the recent wet weather.

It will expedite our efforts to prevent the spread of disease, and we can then take necessary steps toward cleaning the city, Lind said. He said that the health department has on hand a sufficient supply of disinfectant to use on these pools. This disinfectant is poured on the water, and quickly kills all germs. It is a powerful, protective, and odorless substance that might emanate from the stagnant water until the pools can be drained.

Lind also explained that both trash and garbage are handled under contract and that the health department is only in a supervisory capacity. These contracts are entered into by the city with the contractor and can be cancelled or changed at the discretion of the commission as a whole.

ASYLUM TO BE ON PAVING

Also Connects With Entrance to the Jefferson Highway

VINITA, July 9.—Scraper street, leading from the business section of the city north to the city limits, is to be paved with tar and gravel, according to a resolution passed by the city council this week. Four blocks of the pavement will be 26 feet wide and the remainder 18 feet. This street leads to the state hospital for the insane and it is also the Jefferson highway as one enters the city from the north.
