

LENINE TO ENTER EUROPE'S CIRCLE

Lloyd George Understood to Favor Letting In the New Russia

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Will Lenin, head of the Moscow government, shortly be admitted to the councils of Europe?

This question was being seriously considered here today. In many quarters Lloyd George is credited with the desire to put an end immediately to the Anglo-French controversies and thereafter to emulate President Harding by calling a five-power European conference with England, France, Italy and Germany represented, along with Russia.

This plan may be possible only in the distant future, but it is already being talked of. It dovetails with President Harding's desire to see in Europe an international arbitration group similar to the proposed quadruple Pacific pact.

Champions of the plan argue that if such a conference should meet at the expiration of the armistice, it would have a sedative effect on the minor European rivalries which have contributed to strengthen the French military position. It is considered that the proposed conference would act as a brake on French ambitions and would, likewise, give Lloyd George a dominant position in Europe.

TOMMY'S TRAIL 'COLD'

All Clues to Whereabouts of "Terrible One" Exploded Upon Investigation—No Clues.

CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—The trail of the elusive Tommy O'Connor was "cold" again today. Although the search for the fugitive desperado apparently continued unabated, Chicago police admitted that they were without tangible clues to aid them. Reports from widely separated parts of the country continue to tell of "Terrible Tommy" being seen at various points, but in no case has convincing evidence been produced.

The possibility that O'Connor might have been aided in his escape from the county jail by Barney Grogan, Chicago politician, was soon yesterday when the housekeeper at Grogan's farm in Wisconsin testified that two men, one answering the O'Connor description and the other that of the man found dead near Palmyra, Wis., had been the guests of Grogan at his farm. This theory was exploded when it was established that the two men entertained by Grogan were members of an alleged "hustle runner" band who had been arrested at Monroe, Wis., and who obtained aid from Grogan after their release on bond. Authorities of Jefferson county, Wisconsin, after asking Grogan arrest, later absolved him from any connection with the death of the man whose body is held at Palmyra.

The latest report reaching the police is that a man answering O'Connor's description leaped into the Ohio river near Louisville, Ky., and was drowned. Although this clue is being investigated local police are not optimistic regarding it.

BANDITS WORK ON TROLLEY

Hold Up Messenger Boy, One Keeping Passengers Off, and Get \$5,180.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 20.—Two of the boldest robberies that St. Louis police have had anything to do with in some time "stuck up" Edward Edwards, colored bank messenger, on a Market street trolley car shortly before noon today and relieved him of \$5,180 in cash. While one man held the crew and passengers at a distance with his revolver, the other went through Edwards' pockets.

Three thousand dollars in negotiable government bonds in an inside pocket were overlooked by the holdup men.

When the job was finished the men stopped the car and made their escape.

Lowden Sells His Cotton

DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 20.—Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, has signed a contract of the Arkansas Farm Bureau Cotton association to sell all the cotton grown on his 22,000-acre Lincoln county plantation and on his 19,999-acre Mississippi county plantation through the marketing division of the Texas Farm Bureau federation.

Santa Fe Kills Woman

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 20.—Mrs. Josephine L. Stafford, 79, was instantly killed this morning when she was struck by a Santa Fe passenger train at a street crossing. She was hurled about 30 feet by the impact.

Ottawa, Kan., Hit by Fire

OTTAWA, Kan., Dec. 20.—The business district of this town was a scene of ruins today, following a disastrous fire which burned for more than five hours here last night. Damage was estimated at \$30,000.

Dallas Magistrate Again "In Bad"

DALLAS, Dec. 20.—Jess Hassell, for years principal owner of the Dallas Baseball club, faces two more charges of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle as the result of an accident in Oak Cliff recently in which four persons were injured. This makes four cases of this kind pending against Hassell. When the original two cases were called last Friday, Hassell was suffering with nervous exhaustion, according to a doctor's statement. The cases were continued until January 9.


