

### TWO BOYS FAIL TO "MAKE GOOD"

Five Boys Paroled But Two Fail to Render Good Report

JAY, Dec. 20.—Judge Brewster, who is holding a term of district court here, pronounced sentence today on Arthur Baker and Virgil Vanhook, who were charged with burglary Sunday afternoon. These young men, who are about 20 years of age each, with three other boys, committed an act of burglary in the store of Arthur Vogle in the city and returned the stolen property to the owners.

At the October term of the district court each of these five boys entered their pleas of guilty and were paroled. They were also to keep a diary of their daily actions during the time they were each day and what they did.

The boys were brought into the courtroom to make their reports to the court Saturday morning. The court told the boys that Baker and Vanhook had not "made good," and the other three had kept the provisions of the parole. The sentence was continued as to Leslie Cook, Arthur Vogle and Clyde Hulbert, who will have to make another report next April. The other two boys will be taken at once to Grandview by the sheriff where they will begin their sentence of five years.

### State Briefs

**Weevil in Winter Quarters.**

**Coal Mine Is Sealed.**  
 MALESTER—When the cargo was taken into No. 5 mine at Alderson Monday morning it was discovered that the mine was on fire. All efforts to extinguish the fire were fruitless. The mine was sealed for 60 days to another fire. It is the property of the Rock Island Mining company with headquarters at Hartsborne.

 BLAINE—Firebugs are believed to have been responsible for a fire which did slight damage to a hardware shop and cafe building here Sunday. Police officers assert that the walls of the building were saturated with kerosene and that a fall filled with kerosene was ablaze when the firemen arrived.
