

FINDS HIMSELF WITH TWO WIVES

Hurries to Officials to Have One Marriage Annulled

Special to The World. BAILEYSVILLE, Jan. 16.—"Curious" Smith, Oklahoma middleweight boxer, who is seeking a divorce after one week of married life. He is seeking a divorce from his first wife so he will be free to marry his second wife, a bride of a week. Smith married Miss Mary Vargo of Pawhuska on January 6, being under the impression that his first wife, whom he had married in 1917 and who deserted him in 1919, had obtained a divorce from him in Texas. After his marriage to Miss Vargo, Smith received a letter from his first wife informing him that she had not obtained a divorce as she had written him in a previous letter. Smith made haste to hunt up his friend, Judge J. H. Charlton of the district court, who performed the marriage ceremony for him last week, and told the judge of his trouble. Judge Charlton advised him to get a lawyer and make a motion to have his second marriage annulled. This advice was acted upon as fast as Smith could collar an attorney and the annulment was granted by Judge Charlton Saturday afternoon. Smith announces that he will apply for a divorce from his first wife, who is formerly Miss Elizabeth Shipley, and who is said to be living in Tulsa, after which he declares he will marry Miss Vargo just as soon as the law will permit. His second near-bride of a week smiles and announces that she is perfectly willing.

FARMER MURDERS HIS ENTIRE FAMILY

Uses Axe on Wife and 2 Children; Suicide Fails, He Gives Self Up

CHARLESTON, Ill., Jan. 16.—Taking an axe from a shed on his farm early this morning, H. P. Mounroe, 64, slew his entire family while they were asleep. The farmer then walked calmly into Sheriff Aye's office and confessed to killing his wife, Kate, 46, his daughter, Ruth, 16, and son Harry, 14. Deputies were rushed from the sheriff's office to the farm, where they witnessed one of the most gruesome slights in the history of Cook county. Harry, the son, who was slain first, according to the old man's story, was found lying across his bed with a gaping wound in his head and the walls of the room were spattered with gore. His wife, Kate, was found in another room, also dead. The daughter Ruth was still alive when deputies found her in a room on the second floor of the home. She was rushed to a hospital but died from two blows on her head. After committing the crime, the old man said he went to the barn to hang himself, but was unsuccessful. He returned to the "death house," where he remained for three hours watching the bodies before coming to town. Mounroe had been worrying over financial matters, he said, and had been told that a note on a farm he had sold at Yale, Ill., could not be collected because the date of maturity was last Sunday.

Boys Had Too Much Jewelry. PAWNEE—Harry Battorf, 17 years old, claiming to be from Ansonia, was held to the district court here Saturday on a charge of grand larceny. He had two platinum rings, valued at \$1,000 and a platinum wrist watch valued at \$500, which he was seeking to pawn in Pawnee.

Brunley, who was serving a sentence in the county jail on a whiskey charge and who escaped some months ago when a number of prisoners overpowered Jailer Ward, was recently arrested at Lindsay and lodged in jail at Pauls Valley. The sheriff's office has been notified.

Stopped Two Loads of Buckshot. IDABEL—Emmet Jones, who was waylaid and shot near Holly Creek one day last week, is reported improving. Jones received two loads of buckshot in the chest and was thought critically wounded. Bill and Leon Kelly, two young men of the Holly Creek community, are in jail charged with the shooting.

Accomplished Jail Breaks. NORMAN—Three boys who escaped from the Cleveland county jail Saturday and got away in a stolen car were caught at Blanchard the same evening and placed in jail. An unconfirmed report from that place states that the youths had again gained their liberty, getting out of the Blanchard jail in daylight Sunday.

Highway Officials Inspect Proposed Line Chelsea to Nowata. CHELSEA, Jan. 16.—W. L. Jeffords, president of the Northwestern chamber of commerce, and Bee Guthrey of Tulsa, secretary of that body, together with W. A. Kaff, L. C. Ferris and W. C. Matson, Wednesday inspected the proposed interstate route between Chelsea and Nowata. 
