

VISIT AFOOT ALL STATES IN UNION

Walking Party of Three Arrive Here on Way to Pacific Coast

Outfitted all in khaki, booted, head-batted, with packs a-back, a walking party of three strode into Tulsa Thursday afternoon, the feminine member matching the others not only in costume but in easy, effortless gait. They were T. E. Clark and his wife and nephew, Clarence Kugler, of New York City, on the first half of a year's sightseeing trip over America's foot.

The trio has travelled over 3,000 miles, nine-tenths by foot and have traversed 13 states since starting from New York Oct. 13, 1921. They left Kellyville yesterday morning and reached here by mid-afternoon. Friday they will continue on to Kansas City, whence their trip will be "westward ho." They pack 45 pounds of luggage among them. Mrs. Clark bearing the smallest amount. They camp at night when the weather permits and cook at least one meal daily out-of-doors. They are not professional walkers, but undertake the trip for the sake of Clark's health and also win a lot of prizes. Several other parties have failed in trips afoot to every state in the United States, they are determined to make it in time limit, a year. They are pledged not to walk railroad tracks or to ride on the railroad, though they may accept other proffered rides, and also to take no money, though they are required to sell postcards for expenses. Clark, who is a service man, says his position will be open for him Oct. 15 of this year. To prove that they are travelling as they claim, they obtain in each city statements from the

mayor or postmaster and signatures of newspaper editors.

Mrs. Clark says that the greatest enjoyment of the trip to her has been the loss of weight, while Clark rejoices for an exactly opposite reason, that he has gained weight. The three say that they are in much better health than when they shook city dust from their feet four months ago.

OPPOSE COURT TRANSFER

Holdenville Men Think It Would Be An Affront to State Courts.

HOLDENVILLE, Jan. 26.—The Holdenville chamber of commerce has adopted a resolution opposing the adoption of the bill introduced by Senator Harrell in the senate and Congressman Chandler in the house giving federal courts extensive jurisdiction of suits involving Indian titles, and providing for the transfer of any such pending suits from the state to the federal court on motion of either party. Opposition is based on the extreme cost to litigants in traveling great distances to attend federal court, the delay which would ensue from the congestion in the fed-

eral court dockets, and because such a law would be an affront to the state courts.

A resolution favoring the speedy enactment of the ex-servicemen's compensation bill was also adopted.

SECOND SUIT NOW FILED

O. N. G. Company and Bagley This Time Sued by Mrs. Crossley.

Suit for \$50,000 was filed in district court Thursday against the Oklahoma Natural Gas company and W. H. Bagley by Mrs. Gail H. Crossley. It is claimed in the petition that on September 1 of last year a car driven

by Bagley and owned by the gas company ran into a car in which Mrs. Crossley was riding. As a result of the collision, which occurred at Twenty-first and Owasso, it is claimed that Mrs. Crossley is hopelessly insane, and has been crippled and disfigured for life.

Letrand J. Crossley, husband, filed a similar suit three weeks ago for \$132,025 for injuries sustained by himself in the accident and for the loss of his wife. Both petitions claim that Bagley was violating several traffic ordinances at the time of the collision.
