### Broken Arrow Briefs

The ladies of the Baptist church were an Easter dinner and supper in the Grange building on North Main street on Saturday, April 8.

The principal interest in the arrangements of next Sunday's services in Broken Arrow churches centers around the revival meeting in progress at the First M. E. church, conducted by Evangelist Herbert B. Ireland and wife, assisted by the pastor, Rev. L. D. Corning. These services will begin Sunday with services at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. at the First M. At the Pentecostal church services will be conducted both Sunday morning and evening by Rev. Robert E. Smith, pastor. At the Episcopal Lutheran church a special service will be held confirming seven catechumens Sunday morning.
