LANDIS' RULING KEEPING 'BABE' OUT HURTS GAME

Fans Staying Away From Games With Home-Run King on Bench

It begins to look as if Judge Landis' action in barring Babe Ruth from playing league games with his team until May 20 for ignoring a silly baseball rule, has done baseball in general more harm than any other single event since the big bribery case two or three years ago.

The baseball fans are outspoken in expressing their opinion that Ruth is being treated with severity bordering on oppression, and that the interests of the sporting public are ignored entirely. Ruth is the biggest feature in American baseball, a favorite everywhere because of his sensational batting and his interesting personality.

How the Rule Came

Perhaps the baseball magnates, who are the power behind Judge Landis think they can pay no attention to public opinion. It has often been done before in baseball circles. But the baseball fans are likely to change that notion by staying away from games in which Ruth would have to play. He is hired to give certain judgments and perform certain actions, and no doubt is going his duty under the baseball laws of the big league.

Ad Wolgast, former lightweight champion and famous as the man who beat Nat Nelson to a standstill in his forty hard-fought rounds back in 1910, is down and out.


