### Call of the Links Gains Many Converts Here This Season

The article covered this breed completely, from its origin in Yorkshire, England, some 40 years ago, through a district which courses the river Aire, up to the present date. It brought out the fact that the Alredale terrier is a cross between a rough and the old English terrier, and his first name was that of Waterside terrier, being later changed to "Alredale" after the river Aire. Many Alredale "fans" were present, but one and all proclaimed the article contained real news to them.

Miss Leading Lady, the living model, was the center of attraction for a reading on the show or bench points of the breed, was handled in a very explicit manner, by Mr. Dixon, who explained in detail the process of rearing, training and preparing the Alredale terrier for the show bench.

A special committee of three, called the monthly program committee, consisting of Dan Hunt, chairman, C. C. Stonaker and Professor Haekendorf, has been appointed by the president of the Tulsa Kennel Club for reading on a different breed each meeting. This is an entirely new idea, originating with the Tulsa Kennel Club, and will doubtless be adopted by other clubs later on, as it makes meetings not only more interesting, but highly instructive, as well.

Ex-Middleweight Champ Out-Points St. Paul Lad in 12 Rounds

NEW YORK, May 6.—Mike O'Dowd, former middleweight champion, tonight defeated Mike Gibbons of St. Paul in a 12-round contest at Long Island City. O'Dowd received the judges' decision.

Gibbons used a left hook effectively in the early stages of the contest, but tired after the seventh round. O'Dowd landed often to the body and head but his punches were light.

Oklahoma City Walks Off With Aggie Meet

STILLWATER, May 6.—Oklahoma City high school carried off honors in the 14th annual state inter-scholastic track and field meet at Oklahoma A. & M. college today with 44 points. Twenty-three schools played in the competition. Two state high school records fell on the day and two local inter-scholastic marks were bettered.

The order in which the schools placed: Oklahoma City 44 points; Norman 12; Stillwater 11; Lindsay 8; Newkirk 8; Britton 7; Wagoner 6; Covington 5; Erick 5; Prague 5; Blackwell 4; Nowata 4; Lacey consolidated 3; Tulsa 3; Henryetta 3; Putnam City 3; Custer City 1; Okmulgee 1; Guthrie 1; Fairbault 1; Denew 1; Perkins 1; Garber 1; Boone Hazlett, litho Indian athlete, wearing the cardinal of Oklahoma City, jumped ahead of 460 of his individual opponents about the same way. not his old self, but these can be taken with a grain of salt. The chief thing against Lewis is that he never has been considered a very hot puncher. So if he beats the Frenchman it will mean that Carpentier was merely a press-agented fighter who never could fight much or that he has gone back and really is weak physically.

Must Win Decisively.

If Carpentier wins he will gain nothing but the distinction of being a good man who is too small to match with him. Should Lewis win it will make the lightweight division look like a poor one and will never cast a shadow on the ability of Dempsey, who had to take more than a minute to beat the idol of European boxing followers.

It is difficult to figure how Carpentier could afford to take this bout. There has been some talk of his meeting Dempsey again. Properly press agented this fight would have gone over big in London or Paris and made the Frenchman a lot of money. If he beats Lewis, unless he does it in a round or two, and completely outclasses the little Hebrew welterweight, he will be considered a fit opponent for the champion, and if Lewis beats him he is out of the running entirely.

Therefore, Carpentier has nothing to gain and everything to lose by this engagement.

Jack Britton can beat Lewis. So should Lewis win, Britton can easily hold the welterweight and light-heavyweight championships, something heretofore unknown in boxing.
