

**MACCABEES WILL ENTERTAIN 400**

**State Conference of the Women's Benefit Association Opens Today**

Four hundred women from all parts of the state are expected to be here Tuesday for the state conference of the Women's Benefit Association of Macabees. Headquarters will be maintained at the K. of P. hall.

Mrs. May A. C. Sommers of St. Louis, Mo., great commander of the women's benefit association, will be honored guest at the conference and will represent Miss Bina M. West, founder and president of the association. Mrs. Sommers will be the guest of honor at the banquet to be given at Woods' cafe tonight, and will be the principal speaker. The program for the day is in charge of Mrs. Laura M. Pickett, state commander of Oklahoma.

Visitors will be here for the conference from Ardmore, Chickasha, El Reno, Oklahoma City, Sapulpa, Durant, Cleveland, Miami, Commerce, Bartlesville, Enid, Muskogee, Hugo, Shawnee, Guthrie and McAlester. A class of 100 will be received into the association. The Tulsa guards will present the initiation ceremony of the association and other special ritualistic ceremonies will be fancy drills presented by special guards from visiting associations.

One of the matters of business of major importance to come before the association will be decision of the number of members who will represent Oklahoma at the Marathon meet of the association to be held in Los Angeles the latter part of next July and when Oklahoma is given a special place on the program. Mrs. Pickett said yesterday that there will probably be 10,000 people at this meet and that Oklahoma will have its own special trains.

The opening session of today's conference will be held at 9:30 at the K. of P. hall.

**HAS OUTGROWN ITS CLASSROOM**

**Baptist Men's Bible Class Finds That It Must Have Larger Quarters.**

Just as boys outgrow their clothes, the Business Men's Bible class of the First Baptist church has outgrown the classroom which was new last August but which now can not accommodate the large attendance, so the class at its Sunday morning session authorized the building of an addition immediately.

"We need more space badly," E. N. Riley said at a brief session preceding the lesson Sunday morning. "How much will it cost?" some one inquired. "Approximately \$200," he answered. "I will give \$10 towards it." "I'll give \$10," came the quick response and in several minutes by the watch the sum of \$250 was pledged.

The addition will not be constructed by class members as was the classroom. The building will be extended 15 feet to the west, increasing seating capacity to over 350, by present estimates. The structure is located to the south of the church at Fourth and Cincinnati.

**PETERS URGES A SPEEDY WIND-UP**

**Too Much Time Taken in Financing the Civic Building**

The entire amount necessary to construct the proposed civic building should have been subscribed by the end of last week, Charles B. Peters, president of the Chamber of Commerce, declared Monday. More time than should have been necessary has already been spent on this project, he said.

"The workers in this campaign have not only left their business affairs but they are giving freely of their time and money to put over this undertaking," Peters pointed out. "It should not have been necessary for them to spend more than four or five days to obtain the entire amount to insure the erection of this building. This fact should be realized by the people of Tulsa; they should give promptly and liberally as soon as they are solicited. We want to get this matter settled as quickly as possible, not only to know the people here favor the undertaking, but also that we may turn our attention to other matters. There are a number of projects, some of them already started, facing Tulsa. We want to get them all cleaned up, but we must take them one at a time if we are to be successful."

"No intelligent person says the civic building is not needed; everyone here knows it is a necessity and that it will provide a permanent home for the Chamber of Commerce, the Mid-Continent Oil & Gas association and other organizations. It will settle the question of a home for them for the future to come, and will be a monument to progress. Tulsans should be willing and glad to contribute to this project; and they should not delay any longer in making their contributions if they have not already joined those who have given. Let's get this thing settled right away."

**CITY COUNCIL STANDS PAT**

**Not Bluffed by Injunction Against Grand River Scheme.**

**NOTICE To Gas Consumers**

At the hearing before Judge John H. Cotteral of the Federal Court for the Western District of Oklahoma, held at Guthrie, May 4, 1922, the court ruled that all gas sold during the period covered by its restraining order expiring April 27, 1922, should be charged and collected for at the Federal Court rate and the rates then revert to the Corporation Commission rate on and after that date.

Therefore, all April bills for the first and second districts of Tulsa, which cover gas used prior to April 27, 1922, will be at the Federal Court rate—62 cents. The third district will be prorated—62 cents to April 27th and 42 cents thereafter.

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
