

WAR ON GERMANY NOW IMPROBABLE

German Note Accepts All Demands Made by Reparation Board

FRANCE IS SATISFIED

German Loan Is Not Believed Great Stumbling Block by Allied Commission

PARIS, May 30.—The disquieting prospect that France would bring pressure to bear on Germany with the extension of her military occupation as regarded in reparations and political circles is eliminated by the German reply to the reparations commission made public today. It promises to comply with the conditions imposed by the reparations commission, with the proviso that Germany must have aid in the form of foreign loans...

The German government, determined to make the most strenuous endeavors to prevent any further increase in the floating debt, is, however, convinced in the present financial conditions such efforts cannot be carried through unless Germany receives reasonable assistance in the way of a foreign loan. Provided such assistance becomes available, the German government would undertake to deal with the question on the following basis:

The condition imposed in the reply that Germany must have help from a foreign loan was first thought to be a mistake in French translation, since the German text was interpreted as "hope" that this help would be given. Inquiry in Berlin, however, developed the fact that the German government intended to make that promise.
