BOTH SIDES OPEN SHIP BILL FIGHT

President Urges Passage; Democrats Attack Demand for Urgency

WASHINGTON, June 13.—President Harding today opened his fight in congress for early enactment of the administration's ship subsidy bill.

Chairman Campbell of the house rules committee made public a letter from the president, declaring congress would be convened in extraordinary session to consider the marine legislation if congress failed to act on the measure during the present session.

Harding's Viewpoint

In his letter to Chairman Campbell, President Harding said: "I understand that in a very short time the merchant marine bill is to be favorably reported to the house. I am writing to express the hope that your committee on rules will report whatever provision is necessary for its early and final consideration."

"I cannot convey to you how very earnestly I feel the necessity of passing this act.

"So much is involved and such a difficult, discouraging situation will follow if congress fails to sanction the merchant marine bill that I shall feel myself obligated to call congress in extraordinary session to especially consider it if it went over through lack of time or delay beyond the present session."

Would Be Great Failure

President Harding would regard the failure of the subsidy bill to pass congress at this session as "the greatest failure" that could come to him, it was learned authoritatively at the White House this afternoon.

It was pointed out at the same time that the president feels the bill should be passed at this session because of the fact that the next session will be too short for action to be taken.

"I shall be more than glad to cooperate in any way that I can in impressing the house with the urgent necessity of the favorable consideration of this bill," he wrote.

"I am writing an expression of my earnestness to you at this time because I understand it is within the province of the rules committee to report a provision under which there may be secured an early, and, I hope, favorable consideration."

WASHINGTON, June 13.—House republican leaders were pressed today by Representative Garner, democrat of Texas, for a statement as to action on what he described as the three major legislative projects—merchant marine, Muscle Shoals and reclamation.

"On the question of ship subsidy, which will take \$70,000,000 to \$100,000,000 out of the pockets of the people annually, the president is insisting on action," said Mr. Garner. "On the other two he is holding back or taking no interest."

Representative Mondell, the republican leader, replied that the democratic minority, having been responsible "for placing on our doorstep" most of the problems, should assist in solving them.

"God only knows when we will get out from under the shadow of many of them," Mr. Mondell added, insisting that the democratic administration during the war had expended \$2,000,000,000 in building a fleet and pleaded guilty to "a most disgraceful waste of money."

Denying that she had proposed to subsidize private interests, he asserted the question before the country was what is to be done with the great fleet.

"Do you want to sell them to foreigners and have them get under foreign flags?" he asked. "Instead of getting any assistance from the democrats, they are making all possible opposition."

Regarding irrigation, Mr. Mondell declared that in the soldiers' bonus bill, already passed, the house had enacted a most comprehensive measure.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Democratic attack on the administration's ship subsidy bill was launched in the house today by Representative Davis, Tennessee, member of the merchant marine committee, who declared the president, in his desire to see it enacted at this time, has "spurned the advice of his party leaders" and was "clinging alone to the advice of Langer—a man who a few months ago knew absolutely nothing of the subject."

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The appointment of a special committee to express the work of rehabilitating the World war veterans will be urged upon President Harding by Director Forbes of the veterans bureau, it was announced this afternoon.

BELFAST, June 13.—Rival mobs clashed in the York street area last night, using stones as missiles. A bomb also was thrown, the explosion wounding a woman.

LUCKNOW, British India, June 13.—Queen Victoria's successor, Maharaja Gandhi, an ally of Young India, has been arrested on a charge of publishing seditious articles.

MANILA, June 13.—Admiral Joseph D. Sigsbee, commander of the Asiatic squadron, departed today for Chinese waters aboard the flagship Huron. The destroyer fleet left for China last Monday.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 13.—The home mission program of the southern Baptist convention for the next 12 months was the main subject of discussion before the annual meeting of the home mission board here today.

LONDON, June 13.—A dispatch received here from Beijing says that Dr. W. W. Yen, former foreign minister, has been appointed premier.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 13.—More than 400 circulation managers of the United States, representing as many newspapers were here to attend the opening session of the International Circulation Managers association convention, which opened today.

SEBASTIA, Mo., June 13.—Gov. Arthur M. Hyde will deliver the principal address at the laying of the corner stone of the new \$125,000 hog pavilion at the state fair grounds here June 19, it was learned authoritatively today.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13.—J. E. Miller, Jr., governor of the federal reserve bank here, today denied a current rumor that he would resign from the position he has held for seven years. The rumor was "unfortunate," he declared.

LONDON, June 13.—A news agency report that 12 British soldiers captured by Turkish nationalists on the shores of the Dardanelles had been massacred was denied by the war office this afternoon.

SAN ANGELO, Texas, June 13.—John G. Murray, 64, retired lawyer and publisher of the San Angelo Standard, died here today from cancer of the stomach and bright's disease.

(Signed) "K. K. K."

"P. S.: This is no boys' play." McClellan is reported to have sold property in a white neighborhood to a negro woman a week ago. A few days after the woman moved into her home the house was dynamited.
