

SIMON LIKES TO ENFORCE THE LAW

Constable Blames Sheriff Because He Has Failed to Back Him Up

RAIDS ON OWN HOOK

Although Operating for Two Weeks No Arrests Have Yet Been Made

With the assertion that Sheriff W. M. McCullough had absolutely failed to back him up in the enforcement of the law, Charles Simons, available for Justice John H. Quarry yesterday gave his version of the focus at Joe station early Sunday morning.

McCullough said that he had placed Taylor's car, a Ford roadster in a garage he had returned to his office at 9 o'clock Monday morning and when Simons failed to appear promised to come back at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The sheriff said yesterday that Taylor had appeared Tuesday morning but that Simons had not shown up. Taylor, according to McCullough is to appear at the sheriff's office again Wednesday morning.

There are two, or three joints right near where this trouble with Taylor came up. In fact I have searched both a store near there and a large residence for better several times. On one occasion I found two barrels of "choc" in the residence and stored it out.

Last Saturday night I was along the road looking for trouble and saw a car containing five men and four women stop near the house and get a bucket of choc. I seized the stuff and placed the people under arrest and deputized another man near there to watch them while I went through the house. I found some choc in the house and several men and women upstairs violating the law. I arrested all of them and while getting them together I looked out of a window and saw Taylor drive up and buy some choc from another man. I rushed my prisoners out of the house and seized the choc which Taylor had purchased. I searched his car and found a pop bottle full of corn whiskey on the floor of the car. I considered himself under arrest.

Arrested 17 People. He protested and asserted that the whiskey did not come out of his car. The man who owns the store became peeved and began cursing and asserting that I couldn't arrest Taylor. Before I arrested him I already had 17 people arrested and quite a bar of choc in my possession. These other prisoners were also lined to be "hardballed" and I had to knock one of the men down.

I called for assistance from the police but they refused to act saying that it was out of their jurisdiction. I then got a motorist after the sheriff. I waited about an hour but the sheriff did not come but he never showed up. Later Taylor stopped a car and complained that I was trying to "teame him" and that he wanted Sheriff McCullough to come out. A few minutes later the sheriff arrived. He asked me the trouble and I told him I had arrested the people and seized some choc. I pointed out Taylor as the man from whom I had seized the corn whiskey.

The sheriff walked over to Taylor and after a few minutes conversation McCullough told me that he wanted Taylor and that there was hardly enough evidence to justify arresting him and seizing his car. A few minutes later the sheriff took the bottle of corn and he and Taylor drove off in Taylor's car. Sheriff McCullough refused to give me aid and disquieted I left and did not bring in anyone. I don't care about Taylor and his car and those present in the sheriff's office every morning. They don't worry me at all. He refused to give me aid in arresting those people but did help Taylor. That is what makes me mad.

Wants Law Enforced. Simons admitted that he and Cloud had been "crusading" in the county for some time and had not yet made any arrests. He said that he was making the raid because he wanted to see the law enforced. He said that in most cases only a small quantity of choc was used and that convictions could not be obtained in such cases, despite the fact that it is against the law to manufacture and have possession of choc. Simons says that it is even harder to get a conviction when a man is found in possession of a small quantity of corn whiskey. Simons

QUICK ACTION ON SHOALS PROJECT

Officials Anxious for the House Leaders to Take Matter Up

REBOLD WINS POINT

Contempt Proceedings Against Oil Producer of Oklahoma Are Ordered Dismissed

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Prospects for early action by the house on proposed legislation for development of the government's projects at Muscle Shoals, were brightened today by authoritative announcement from the White House that administration officials were willing and anxious for house leaders to act on the matter with a free hand.

President Harding, it was said, has taken no position in opposition or support of Henry Ford's proposal, believing that its acceptance or rejection by congress was a question for legislation decision only. At the same time, it was further explained, the president realizes the great possibilities for the national good that might result by exploitation of the Alabama properties, irrespective of the form such development might take.

What action the house will take, Representative Mondell, the republican leader announced, would be decided in conference of majority members. He added, however, that the decision would be formulated "in the near future."

Representative Garrett of Tennessee, acting democratic leader, told his colleague the regulations would have an interesting time if they brought in the ship subsidy bill and refused to give consideration to the disposal of the Muscle Shoals units which promised, if allowed further development, to produce cheaper fertilizer for the farmers.

FORD TAKES OVER LINCOLN FACTORY

Rumored Henry Has Had Falling Out With Leland Brothers

DETROIT, May 13.—Management of the Lincoln Motor company, purchased recently at a receiver's sale by Henry Ford, will be transferred from Henry M. and Wilfred C. Leland, to the combined Ford Motor company and Lincoln organizations. It was said here today.

At the time of the purchase it was announced Henry M. Leland and his son, would be retained in executive capacities.

Announcement of the change of management declared a realignment of relationships was found necessary in order to obtain complete assistance of the Ford resources to the Lincoln properties.

Mr. Ford purchased the Lincoln company for \$3,000,000. Today's announcement was made by Harold H. Emmons, who represented Mr. Ford in the negotiations that led to purchase of the property. He declined to state whether he was speaking as a representative of the Leland or the Ford's, saying he was acting as "an attorney in Lincoln matters." Confirmation of reports that differences over the conduct of the plant led to a break between Mr. Ford and the Leland's also was unobtainable.

REBOLD WINS POINT

Contempt Proceedings Against Oil Producer of Oklahoma Are Ordered Dismissed

By the Associated Press Staff Wire. OKMULGEE, June 13.—Contempt proceedings against John H. Rebold in the superior court before Special Judge W. C. Alley for alleged failure to comply with a decree of the court for the building of his former wife a home, and cessation of payment of \$300 per month alimony, were dismissed today. Mrs. Rebold's alimony allowance was cut to \$150 per month. Should the federal court exempt Mr. Rebold's palatial home east of Okmulgee from claims of his creditors, payments of \$500 a month alimony are to be resumed, and an \$8,000 home erected, according to the decree of the court. Counsel for Mrs. Rebold objected to Superior Court Judge H. R. Christopher hearing the contempt proceedings and by agreement Mr. Alley was appointed special judge.

PAVING TAX IS ILLEGAL

Supreme Court Upholds Court in Knocking Out Assessment

average amount of tax \$148.68 and the average tax rate 1.54 per cent, while as relating to the entire population of the country, subject to the federal income tax, the proportion filing returns was 4.85 per cent, the per capita net income reported was \$273.87 and the per capita income tax was \$10.14.

For the calendar year 1920, there were 7,729,244 personal income tax returns filed reporting a total net income of \$13,735,629,183 and yielding a total tax of \$1,075,953,685, as compared with 5,532,769 returns for a total income of \$10,839,431,419 and a tax yield of \$1,259,630,194 in 1919.

New York led the states in the number of returns filed, the amount of income reported and in tax yield while Pennsylvania was second and Illinois third.






