Principals in Labor Day Card Here Never Pass Up Dangerous Men

Both men have been seeking a bout with Harry Greb, the Pittsburgh windmill, for many months, and the Smoky City wonder has as consistently dodged a match with Smith as has Johnny Woodson, the middleweight champion. Both apparently are afraid of Smith as a "fin-canned terror" of small boys.

Takes Them All. But Smith has turned down nothing in the way of a bout in recent years. He has not even drawn the color line. In fact he takes great delight in showing that his ring generalship and knowledge is superior to any colored fighter near his weight who will enter the ring with him. Just this week he did everything but maul the daylight out of Jamaica Kid, one of the best black fighters in the game, once he had stayed the 12-round limit with Sam Langford and many other big colored fighters.

However, when Smith hooks up with Jackie Clark, the A. E. F. middleweight champion here Labor day at the Elks All Star boxing card at convention hall, he is going to be in the ring with another very stern middleweight who has barred none of the boys from the 200-pound class down to his own weight.

Out of a "Buck." Both Smith and Clark seem to be unpopular boys when it comes to getting a chance at the man who holds the title. Tulsa fans can easily realize why it has had to be Smith to get a bout. Easily he is one of the most finished products the boxing game has ever turned out. He is not only clever, but a ring general, an educated man, and a man who thinks before he acts in most every instance.

Clark, on the other hand, is one of the boys Pennsylvania has ever produced. Had it not been for the World war today he might not be in the boxing game. He went across with the boys, fought with them in training for the air, and then when amusement was needed volunteered his services as a boxer. Contest after contest resulted in him the victor. Finally he was declared the middleweight champion of the A. E. F. a title he never had been ashamed of, for all the boys tried for it.
