Ticker Tape NEW YORK.—Texas Coal and Oil is planning to lay a 49-mile 4-inch pipeline from its production in Garfield county, Oklahoma, to a point on the Santa Fe railway, where it intends erecting a refinery. The plant will have an initial capacity of 2,000 barrels, with cracking stills. Production averages about nine barrels daily, some of which is going into storage. The plant is looked for in regular dividend of 25 cents a share quarterly. Directors' meeting next month.

NEW YORK.—Through discovery of oil on acres that formerly were regarded as "washed," there has been abrupt change in oil prices. Producers and refiners are reacting favorably over night. Large values have been added to the property. Some of these developments have taken place during the past several months. Just occurred in the finding of oil in Lost Soldier field in Carbon county, Wyoming.

That discovery is so big as to warrant construction of a refinery at Fort Steele, Wyo., on the Union Pacific. Work already has started on a pipeline from Lost Soldier field to that point, in the center of the management of Lost Soldier, which is only one structure on a great anticline extending more than twenty miles eastward from that point to Fort Steele, Wyo., so rich in oil that it is contemplated extending this line eventually to Omaha, Neb., where another refinery is expected to be constructed.

NEW YORK.—Daily consumption of domestic and imported crude oil in September, averaging 1,653,567 barrels, was higher than the daily average in any previous month, according to the geological survey. The daily average in August was 1,617,413 barrels, and in July, 1,590,000 barrels, the largest on record and 82,000,000 barrels more than a year ago.

Hughes May Step Into Sakhalin Oil Tangle WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Next step of Secretary of State Hughes in conducting "oil diplomacy" of present case may be taken with Japan in connection with recent oil concessions in northern Sakhalin, which the Phillips company obtained from government of far eastern republic. Information has been received here, however, that Japanese government is not inclined to recognize Sinclair concession, Japanese military forces occupy northern Sakhalin as security for indemnification for killing of number of Japanese nationals in Siberia, which far eastern republic refuses to grant.

Attractive Burbank Acreage For Next Sale Ponca City, Oct. 28.—When another sale of Osage oil leases is held by the United States department of Indian affairs, one of the quarter sections offered will be, beyond any doubt, the southwest of 20-27-6e, which is only 300 feet from the big well brought in by the Osage oil company during the past week in the northwest of 29-27-6, which made 3,000 barrels daily after being given a healthy shot.

Work on Texas company's new 6,000-barrel refinery east of Casper is more than 50 per cent complete and it is practically assured that it will be finished before close of year and running through its full capacity. Company has about completed its initial storage program which called for erection of eight 65,000 barrel steel tanks and number of smaller capacity. With completion of this

first storage unit, it is starting on another section which will cost \$4,000. In barrel tanks, material having been shipped for first 10 of these—Inland Oil Index.

New Wyoming Gasser The Wyoming Oil Fields corporation, subsidiary of the Midwest Oil company, on Monday completed a 25,000,000-foot gas well in the Baxter Basin district near Rock Springs. This well is seven miles from the original gasser drilled by the Ohio Oil company several months ago. An effort will be made to shut off the gas and resume drilling to the oil sands.

Tank Car Works for Tulsa The North American Car company, who has a 30-acre plant at West Tulsa, adjoining the property of Corden & Co., are installing the necessary machinery to make general repairs on tank cars. Godfrey M. Brigham of Coffeyville has come here as superintendent in charge of the local plant and, outside of taking care of 250 cars owned by Tulsa refiners, will repair his own equipment passing through here and will be in a position to handle tank car repair work for other companies. Tulsa is especially well located for this class of work.

The shop at Coffeyville is operating to full capacity. Outside of the tank car work, the company is equipped to repair wooden and steel cars, and at the present time has a large contract for this work. George E. Brigham, district manager for the southwest, located here, says that tanks were installed some time ago, and as the necessary machinery is already here, and a large part of it installed, the plant will be ready to take care of repair work early this week.

Much Activity in Wilson Pool The Hiram C. Wilson No. 1, in the southeast corner of the northeast of the northeast of 8-15-8, is now 20 days old, and is making 95 barrels per hour, 2,280 barrels per day. This well has average depth of 2,500 barrels daily since being drilled in September 26. The oil is 43 gravity and commands 50 cents premium. It is being run by the Corden and Texas companies. The well is five feet in the sand which was topped at 3,234 feet. This sand is very hard. Tools are still hanging in the hole. The immediate erection on this property of a 2-unit casinghead and water pump is being planned.

The No. 2 in the northeast corner of the section is drilling at 550 feet. No. 3, in the northwest corner of the northeast, is drilling at 250 feet. On the No. 4, in the southeast corner of the north half of the northeast of the same section, rig is being built. Nos. 2, 3 and 4 are compulsory offsets.

On the Yonka Harjo farm, well No. 1 is being drilled in the southeast corner of the northwest of the southwest of 20-16-9 (allowing Bristow). This well is drilling at 625 feet, after landing 13 1/2-inch casing at 25 feet. They are also moving in tools to drill the No. 1 McIntosh in the southeast corner of the northeast of 7-16-10. All of these wells are being drilled by the Hiram C. Wilson oil syndicate.

Transcontinental Well Heads Up and Flow The Transcontinental well in the southwest of the northwest of the northeast of 23-19-10 is reported as showing for 100 barrels as it now stands. Up to yesterday forenoon it had headed up and made two flows, making a 90-barrel flow Friday night. The oil is coming through 400 feet of open hole. A 3 1/2 inch casing was set at 3,452 feet and the sand was found at 3,462 feet. At one foot in the well began to make gas and at two feet in the oil was struck. The total depth of the well at present is reported to be 3,864 feet. The owners now are planning to run a special string of 4-inch casing before attempting to drill the well deeper.

This is the third attempt of the Transcontinental to get a hole down at this location. Twice the hole was lost and twice the rig was skidded to a new location. Now, after a year of endeavor, the company has what its officials believe to be an excellent well.

The oil is of a light amber color and appears to be light enough to use without refining. As it comes from the well it has showed a gravity of as high as 37, but it is so volatile that by the time it has gotten to a laboratory and, with temperature corrected, the gravity is slightly above 42.

Bristow Production Now 65,000 Barrels Production in the Bristow district now is down to around 65,000 barrels daily, according to Claude L. Freeland of the Roland Oil company. This is considerably below the high mark that was reached several months ago, although figures are not available as to the maximum output reached in that territory.

The Roland company discovery well in 2-13-8, which came in for 20,000 barrels daily and then quit flowing after producing something like 500,000 barrels, has been idle for some time, but a compressor now has been installed and the well is being flowed with air. It is making a lot of water and very little oil. The company No. 2 on the same lease is making 175 barrels a day of clean oil. The largest production in this particular district is from the Carter's 80-acre Lulu Catt lease directly north of the big Roland well. This property is reported to be making around 9,000 barrels daily with very little water trouble. The Roland's total production in the Bristow district now is something like 2,500 barrels a day.

Practically the only new work now starting in the Bristow territory consists of necessary offsets. Drilling will not start up again, according to Mr. Freeland, other than with his company or any other of the big producers in the Bristow field, until the price of oil has advanced.

Johnson County, Arkansas Getting Big Play Four deep tests are now drilling in Johnson county, Arkansas, and arrangements are being made for the starting of two others in the near future.

Indahoma Refining company's second well in 15-10-24 offsetting its big gas well in 22-10-24 is now drilling at 1,870 feet. It expects the test at 2,200 feet.

The Piney Oil & Gas Co. a West Virginia company, is drilling at 2,500 feet in its Watkins No. 1 in 4-2-22. It has sufficient gas in this well for fuel. Had a good oil showing at 1,620 feet. This well will go to 4,000 feet or deeper if indications warrant.

Trinity-Grey No. 1 in 25-10-23 is drilling at 2,400 feet with some gas at three different depths. This well will also be a deep test.

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Several of the larger companies from Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana have geologists and scouts in the section. Lease trading is brisk, but most of the acreage is held by large companies.

Test Started in 29-15-9 The Chase Oil & Gas Co. and George David have started a deep test in the northwest of 29-15-9. The well now is drilling at 250 feet.

Cosden 15-10-8 Test Gets Another Sand A report last yesterday from the Cosden test in the southeast of the northwest of 15-10-8 was to the effect

that another sand had been topped at slightly below 2,400 feet and it was showing considerable gas.

Pawnee County J. Alex Dingwall, jr., in the northwest corner of the southeast of 27-23-4, on the Edwards farm, is drilling out a joint of 5 3-16 casing. Total depth is now 3,915 feet. This well has been drilling for about two years.

Daniel and associates spudded in yesterday to make a Wilcox test in the northeast corner of the southeast of 27-21-7, about a mile north-west of the town of Hunt, on the Moran farm. They expect to reach the Wilcox sand between 30 and 60 days.

Dry Hole in 18-10. Wilcox & Ballwell has a hole full of water at 3,112 feet in their well in the southeast of the northwest of the southeast of 17-18-10. Well has been abandoned.

Okfuskee County Howarth Oil & Gas Co. in the northeast of the northwest of the southwest of 15-13-10, Okfuskee county, had a good showing of nice free oil in the Dutcher sand from 2,835 to 2,860 feet.

Jefferson County J. Alex Dingwall, jr., has resumed drilling at 1,907 feet in the southeast corner of the north half of the northwest of 25-8-59. This well was shut down several weeks ago on account of shortage of water.
