DELAY LETTING CONTRACT

Federal Veterans Bureau to Sign Up for Hospital Next Month.

MUSKOGEE, Nov. 28.—Contract for use of the Oklahoma Soldier Memorial hospital by the United States veterans bureau for the rehabilitation of World war veterans will be closed early in December, a telegram from Dr. Hugh Scott, acting director of the bureau, indicates today.

Telegraphing to Horace Hagan of Tulsa, member of the Oklahoma soldiers' relief commission, Doctor Scott today announced that a committee of three will leave Washington next week to arrive here about December 4 to close the contract and to lease the state's half-million-dollar institution that is now being rapidly completed on Agency hill.
