

Miami Bank Closed by State in Order That Funds of Depositors Be Protected

MIXES OIL WITH BEEF PRODUCTION

Greenwood County Has Big Output of Both Lines During the Year

379 OIL PRODUCERS

Romance Abounds in Work of Finding Crude Petroleum in Busy Sunflower Field

EUREKA, Kan., Dec. 9.—The beautiful hills, slopes and valleys of Greenwood county, far-famed ranch and cow country, produced some of the best beef and beef products during the year just past, according to a report made on the county's oil production for the last 12 months, compiled by A. T. McCollm, owner of the Scouts club here, an oil field service covering all of Greenwood county and the territory adjoining it on all sides.

For the year ended November 1, 1922, the county and the territory adjacent to it produced 379 commercial oil wells, with a total of 501 completions, McCollm figures. Failures equal less than one-fourth of the number of wells drilled.

Produces 13,000 Barrels a Day.
Greenwood county wells alone—not counting those in adjacent territory—are now estimated to be making upward of 13,000 barrels of oil a day—most of it high gravity production.

A year ago the Kansas City Refining company and Mission Oil company of Kansas City went in with Clarence Roth and William Faurel, experienced operators, on an undeveloped block of acreage northwest of Eureka near the northwestern edge of Greenwood county. The territory surrounding the test well was held entirely by those interests. The first well was a 300-barrel initial well of good grade oil found about 2,500 feet deep in 10 days. They then started upon a drilling campaign. They have completed 10 wells, every one a producer with output of 1,500 barrels a day. They entirely control the pool, for operators who took acreage and drilled wells as near as possible have in every case met with failure.

The Marshall Hill pool has been opened by S. J. Polhamus and others of Bartlesville and Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas company, which is an extensive operating property of the Ohio Oil company, an old Standard company. It is in 24-24-9 and 8-25-9, with oil at 2,265 feet in 50 to 75 feet of sand. The Polhamus organization likewise found another pool, the Dehinger, owned by Smith, Tidal and others in section 29 of 22-23-13, Virgil district, with oil at 1,925 feet in 20 feet of sand.

Flinn, Gillespie, Couden and others hold properties in the Sealey and Griffin pools, where oil is found at only 1,655 feet in 12 to 20 feet of sand.

The Sealey Pool Best?
The Sealey pool promises to be one of the most prolific in the county. It was found by F. H. Lauck and Moore. These operators, White Eagle, Johnson-Vickers, Empire and Phillips-Ebbing companies now have excellent production from the 1,335-foot sand, which in some cases is 50 feet thick. Location is 5-23-11, also in the northwest part of the county.

The Brickett pool is located southwest of the Sealey pool, the geological conditions somewhat similar, except that sand is found deeper. It was only recently opened and is the scene of much development work.

The romance of a few men's determination against bitter odds brought about the discovery of the "Hardy Able" pool in the northeast city limits of Eureka itself. Many tests had been drilled in this district only to be abandoned. Charles McGinnis and his associates started a well in 2-23-10, in spite of these failures. Drilling was slow, in spite of shortage of money. In return for supplies and labor, they gave interest in the well, and as drilling progressed slowly it earned the name of the "Hardy Able" test. Finally creditors grew impatient and the sheriff visited the well with foreclosure notices. He was persuaded to wait until morning when the owners hoped to bring in the well

Miller Brothers Plan to Take \$20,000 Saddle to Wichita

WICHITA, Kan., Dec. 9.—The Miller brothers, owners of the 101 Ranch at Elles, Okla., have agreed to cooperate with the Wichita traveling men in putting on their show here at the Arcadia theater during the livestock exposition, January 22-27, said C. M. Irwin, manager of the show on his return from the ranch.

"In addition, Joe Miller has promised to bring his famous \$20,000 stock saddle to be exhibited at the show. This saddle is studded with many different kinds of precious stones and is said to be the most valuable saddle in the world. We intend to exhibit it at the Rose room in the Arcadia theater each evening during the show," Mr. Irwin said.

An old cow town of 1870 will be reproduced each evening by the traveling men of the city. It is planned that decorations will include a prairie schooner, "chuck" wagon, dance halls, saloons, and every kind of amusement that will recall days of the pioneers will be provided. The entertainment each evening and traveling men will wear "10-gallon" hats.

The hats were ordered through the McVicker Howard Millhaugh Clothing company and will arrive today. The hats will be sold to traveling men on a wholesale cost basis. All members of the Traveling Men's Booster club will assemble Saturday on their hats and march to the Broadview hotel where they will hold a noon luncheon. Cards explaining the reason for wearing the cowboy hats will be carried by each man.

'LITTLE FRANCE' IS FOUQUET FARM

Orchard Near Chandler Is Attractive Place to Visit

MEEKER, Dec. 9.—One of the most interesting places in Lincoln county is Dreamland fruit farm, owned by L. C. Fouquet. To get to this 150-acre farm, 130 acres of which are in fruit, one must leave the main trail between Meeker and Chandler and drive through three or four miles of rocky country in all its natural beauty, unspoiled by any attempt at good road making. On emerging from an oak grove one comes suddenly to a bulletin board which announces the sales for the day at Dreamland. From the time one drives through the open gate past the long row of pear trees which have been trained on wire until they resemble giant men standing with arms akimbo until one drives out of the same gate late in the day there has not been one dull moment. Recently a party of Meeker people motored to the farm and were met at the door of an old-fashioned log cabin by Mrs. Fouquet and daughter, Emily, and were invited to a special supper which immediately began affording us entertainment. It was a bright but crisp autumn day and a wood fire was glowing on the open hearth. The walls of this room were covered with oil paintings, among them were the portraits of Mr. Fouquet's great-grandparents Fouquet, done by Jacques.

Twelve Acres in Grapes.
Mrs. Fouquet and Miss Emily proved such delightful hostesses that the visitors did not have ample time to see the wonders of the farm which she so graciously showed to us because of the absence of her father. She proved to be a delightful and efficient guide, telling of the various kinds of grapes in the 12-acre vineyard, of the blackberry in the three-acre patch; she demonstrated the use of the spray wagon; and illustrated how the crates containing the five-gallon bottles of sterilized fruit juices were lifted by pulley from the immense vat and carried by machinery to another part of the room and left on a bench, where they were sealed and left to cool. This fruit house, the dwelling house and the barnyard are piped for water from a well; a windmill supplying the power.

Of special interest are the fig trees which Mr. Fouquet brought from France on his last trip there. They are not pretty in their manner of growing, nor are they profitable for growing only as a novelty, requiring protection in the winter. The fruit, according to Miss Emily, is of fine quality and is a delicious flavor.

Fouquets Came From France.
Mr. and Mrs. Fouquet are both natives of France but have been in this country since they were quite young. Mr. Fouquet has made several trips to France, bringing back

Jurors in Young Case Break Rule And Convict Him

HOMINY, Dec. 9.—Jurors in the case of Harrison Young spoiled one of the Oage county's evil distinctions when they found Young guilty of killing Al Black. It has been said for years that no person can be convicted of murder in Oage county—that jurors won't convict. Young was convicted of manslaughter, but the jury came near assessing the limit penalty for that crime. He was sentenced to 17 years in prison. Heretofore nearly all juries in murder cases have acquitted the defendants or disagreed. Many a disagreement has resulted and lawyers have learned to play for such a tie-up known as "a mistrial."


The killing occurred at a dance near Oage, December 10, 1921. Black was host and Young, who was drinking, appeared to take serious offense at a casual remark. The cause of the killing was not accurately determined. The jury was an unusually intelligent one and Judge Wilson gave it latitude in the verdict. The state asked for conviction of murder, but the absence of motive probably prevented a verdict of murder. Young is probably less than 30 years old. He has borne a good reputation. He is a farmer and the son of a farmer living near Oage.

The most pleasing feature, however, of this farm is the fresh water lake fed by dripping springs. At a great expense and labor Mr. Fouquet has built a causeway across one of the ravines and has dug an overflow ditch to carry off the surplus water from heavy rains. The lake is stocked with black bass and perch; the ditch is screened to keep the fish in during heavy waters. This is surrounded by native trees and various wild flowers left in their natural loveliness with the undergrowth cut out enough to make an ideal picnic ground.
