18 Tulsans Have Prominent Mention in 1923 Edition of Who's Who in America

Take "Who's Who in America" for example. There are a lot of people who believe that there's enough in a name to have one's name in that book, and Oklahoma has its quota of celebrities thus temporarily graven on its tablets in the hall of fame.

Perhaps in no other way is the truth that Oklahoma has virtually no native sons as yet well proven as a personal of Who's Who.

Judge Summers Hardy lost little time in coming to Oklahoma from Texas soon after his college days and was admitted to the bar in Ardmore in 1897.

Charles Townsend Kirk, geologist, has a somewhat varied geographical background. Beginning with his native state, Indiana, he early transferred his residence to Oklahoma.

Clarence B. Douglas is another of the men who have had an active part in the moulding of state and civic history.
