
This Being Mohammedan Sunday, the Delegates to Moroccan Conference Cease From Their Labors.

He stated that farmers' elevators had increased the price of wheat from four to five cents per bushel wherever they were located.

He emphatically endorsed the McCumber grain inspection bill.

He believed there should be a farmers' elevator at every station in North Dakota, and this would give the farmers absolute control of the grain trade in the state, and compel the grain terminals to stand up and take notice.
