POSTAL FRAUDS

Beavers Pleads Guilty to Conspiring With Former U. S. Senator—A Two Year's Sentence Given.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13.—In the criminal court today George Will Beavers pleaded guilty to the indictments charging him with conspiring with former Senator Geo. H. Green of Binghamton, N. Y. and W. D. Doremus to defraud the government in connection with the furnishing of postal supplies and also of bribery and was sentenced to two years in Moundsville, W. Va. penitentiary.

COMPLAIN OF THEIR RATES

Hastings Company Files Complaints Against Milwaukee Road.

Washington, Feb. 13.—The Hastings Mailing company of Hastings, Minn., today filed with the interstate commerce commission two complaints against the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway company, one alleging that themselves, the city of Hastings and dealers are required to pay unjust and unreasonable rates of transportation on coal from Superior, Wis. to Hastings, and also that on shipments of grain they were discriminated against in favor of merchants, dealers and shippers to St. Paul and Minneapolis. They ask the commission to require the defendant road to desist in their alleged violations of the interstate commerce law.

PREPARE FOR BLOCKADE.

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 13.—The Iowa railroads began preparing today for another snow blockade. A heavy snow storm which began falling early today in central Iowa became general by 9 o'clock and accompanied by a high wind, which is drifting it. Snow plows are being made ready in anticipation of a general tie-up.

PEACE AT BUTTE.

Butte, Mont., Feb. 13.—Arthur C. Cardon, representing Thoms F. Cole of Duluth, this morning took possession of all the mines and mining property of the F. Augustus Heinze and the United Copper company in Silver Bow county which have been in controversy or litigation with the Amalgamated Copper company. This means that peace has come to the warring copper mining interests of Butte.

BORED BY A TUG; THREE VESSELS FOUNDERED

Three Lives Lost By Collision During Fog in East River.

New York Feb. 13.—At least three lives are believed to have been lost in the East river today when one vessel was cut completely in two and two others had holes stove in them by a tug boat which was running blindly in the fog and rammed into the shipping at the foot of East Twenty-first street.

PROCLAMATION BY GOVERNOR.

Odessa, Feb. 13.—General Kaulbars, governor general of Odessa has issued a proclamation declaring that every one attempting to kill or killing an official by means of explosives, arms or otherwise or who is found in possession of deadly implements will henceforth be condemned to capital punishment without inquiry or trial.

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WM. WILLIAMS IS HANGED TODAY IN ST. PAUL

Man Who Murdered Mrs. Keller and Son Pays the Penalty.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 13.—The execution of William Williams took place at an early hour this morning in the Ramsey county jail. Sheriff Meisen performed the execution, which took place in the basement of the jail in the presence of a small number of witnesses. The crime of Williams was the murder of a Mrs. Keller and her small son last April.

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
