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RICHARDSON FAINTS WHEN ACCUSED OF PERJURY

Sensational End of the Trial of the Minot Commissioners—Two Are Ousted.

(Special to The Evening Times.) Minot, N. D., Feb. 12.—Last evening at 11:45, Judge E. B. Goss issued an order removing two of the Ward county commissioners from office at Minot. The order followed brief arguments by the attorneys and the court adjourned at once.

Commissioners S. S. Richardson and L. E. Carroll were removed on three distinct charges of malfeasance in office. The first and gravest being the letting of the 150 court calendars to the Minot Optic at the enormous price of \$389.87; charging the county \$150 for a trip to St. Paul to interview the officials of the Soo and for charging excessive per diem. Some of their monthly bills shows forty days to the month. The commissioners will pay the expense of the trial and were given sixty days in which to do it.

The other commissioner included in the accusation, William Black, was acquitted of all the charges. At a late hour this afternoon the auditor, county judge and the other commissioners are considering the appointment of two new commissioners. Yesterday afternoon a most sensational incident occurred when Judge Goss accuser Richardson of perjuring himself and the witness fainted. In answer to a question he said that he had never had any conversation relative to the letting of the court calendar to the Optic and when the court called his attention to the evidence where he had twice testified to having such a conversation, he fainted.

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
