MRS. EDMONDS WON

Damage Suit Against the City Owing to Defective Walks Costs \$500 Besides Expense of Trial—Hard Fight of City Attorney George A. Bangs.

Yesterday evening the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff in the case of Mary Catherine Edmonds vs. the city of Grand Forks and assessed the damages at \$500.

There is an increasing number of such damage suits in the city owing to the general condition of the walks. City Attorney Bangs made a hard fight to prevent the securing of damages in this case.

During the eight years of Mr. Dinnie's former administration, the total amount of damage cases filed amounted to \$10,400, and the total amount of judgments recovered against the city was \$800, and this was for damage

sustained on a walk built by a citizen and allowed to slope. During the two years of Mr. Duis' administration the amount of the damage suits filed is \$52,500, and judgments against the city have been recovered to the amount of \$1,850, and all were due to the explicit negligence of the city employes.

ART. TURNER'S STATEMENT

Sheriff of Grand Forks County Gives the Facts Relative to Deputy Thomas Gray's Campaign and the Misrepresentations of the Two Ring Organs.

"I am a member of the republican party whom the Herald and Mayor Duis' private organ sees fit to call the gang," said Sheriff Turner to an Evening Times reporter, "and the political tramps of this city. Turner is connected with the office of sheriff in the state of North Dakota, and it is the unanimous opinion of people in this city that he has been absolutely just and fair with Mr. Gray, as well as with everyone with whom he has ever had any dealing, and the comments of the two papers mentioned above regarding this little affair have fallen flat in the minds of the people of this city.

GOVERNOR WILL PLAY FAIR.

Nine Officials Accused of Murder to Have Fair Trial. Associated Press to The Evening Times. Boise, Idaho, March 23.—Governor Gooding today issued a proclamation directed to the labor unions of the country who have been sending letters

and resolutions asking for a fair trial for the accused officers of the Western Federation of Miners, accused of murdering Former Governor Steunenberg of Idaho, stating that the men will get a fair trial and if the unions will send a committee of men to him he will give them an opportunity to hear from Harry Orchard the same confession he made to the detectives and to the grand jury to seek a cause for indictment for larceny against Geo. W. Perkins, former vice president of the New York Life Insurance company, who admitted giving political contributions, and against George B. Certel-you, chairman, and Cornelius N. Bliss, treasurer, of the republican national committee, as receivers of stolen goods. District Attorney Jerome said, addressing the court: "If your honor will sit as magistrate in this case, I will submit affidavits as to the facts committed by Geo. W. Perkins and will ask a warrant for his arrest. A writ of habeas corpus will follow and the case will be taken to the highest court." Justice O'Sullivan refused to grant the warrant.
