Some Damage Cases.

The case of the Great Northern Railway company against Engel was in court today on plaintiff's motion for a rehearing, and the court held that unless the defendant agreed to accept \$2,250 in lieu of the verdict for \$2,000 allowed by the jury, that a new trial would be granted. An appeal will be taken on this order. In the case of the same plaintiff against Shue et al. where the defendants had failed to answer the court allowed a judgment for \$1,850, which counsel for the defendants refused to accept and in the event of a refusal of the lower court to open the case, an appeal will be taken.

Duis Men Are Hedging.

The Duis supporters who were very flush with money earlier in the campaign are beginning to hedge. R. H. Piper of Casselton filed a petition in bankruptcy with the clerk of the U. S. court yesterday, stating his liabilities to be \$1,655.57 and assets \$550, all of which is claimed exempt. A petition in bankruptcy was filed with the clerk of the federal court yesterday by Fred J. Freeman, a Kansan farmer. He estimated his liabilities to be \$11,496.36 and assets \$8,060.50, with \$453 in exemptions.

Standard Oil Officials Who Failed to Appear in Court Today.

Arnold of the Standard Oil company were declared in default when they failed to appear today before Commissioner Frederick H. Sanborn in the action brought by Attorney General Herbert S. Hadley of Missouri to oust from Missouri the Standard Oil Company of Indiana and companies alleged to be controlled by it. When the commissioner appeared to resume the hearing today, counsel for both the Standard Oil company and Hadley came before him and announced that a stipulation has been signed between Hadley and the counsel for

the Standard Oil interests providing for resumption of the hearing tomorrow morning.
