TWO ARE KILLED IN BATTLE FOLLOWING

Sweetheart Threatened to Leave Him, Bullet Ends Unrequited Love Affair.



PERKINS DISCHARGED BY SUPREME COURT

WIPED OUT

Plant of Union Fiber Company at Winona, Minn., Suffers Second Disastrous Fire Within a Week.

EMPLOYEES ESCAPE FROM SMOKING RUINS

The Loss is Estimated at \$114,000, Covered by Insurance—Cause of Fire Unknown.

Associated Press to The Evening Times. Winona, Minn., May 25.—At an early hour this morning the main buildings of the Union Fibre company in the west part of the city were entirely destroyed by fire. Three men were in the buildings at the time the fire started, but they have been accounted for.

Last Saturday the Union Fibre company suffered a loss of about \$10,000 caused by the burning of one of its largest warehouses, which, with today's fire, practically annihilates the plant. The loss, which will be heavy, about \$140,000, covered by insurance.

SWEPT BY FIRE.

BEATEN TO DEATH IN MINNEAPOLIS RESORT

Chicago Man Dies From Injuries—Inmates Held as Witnesses.

Minneapolis, May 25.—Frank Brane of Chicago died at the city hospital today as the result of treating he received during a general fight in a resort at 217 Eleventh avenue, south, early this morning. Brane was beaten unconscious with a club or some other blunt weapon. One man, said to be J. C. McEwen, and another whose name is not given, besides a number of girl inmates of the resort, are held by the police as witnesses.

BRANDED A THIEF.

State Senator Says Standard Oil Company Never Invented Anything.

Cleveland, May 25.—State Senator Louis Emery of Bradford, Pa., testifying before the interstate commerce commission in the Standard Oil hearing was asked concerning the conditions in Pennsylvania when the oil pipe lines were constructed in that state. "The first pipe lines in Pennsylvania were not invented by the Standard Oil company," he said "the Standard Oil company never invented anything. It has always stolen what somebody else created."

WELCOMED

Alfonso Greets His Future Bride, Princess Ena, With Marked Courtesy and Unaffected Joy at Irun, Spain.

ROYAL COUPLE LEAVE FOR CITY OF MADRID

Amidst Cheers of Populace—Princess Given an Ovation by Officials and the Public.

Irun, Spain, May 25.—King Alfonso greeted his bride, Princess Ena of Battemberg as she entered Spain in the early hours of morning amidst an enthusiastic popular welcome. The special train bearing the princess reached the frontier shortly after sunrise. The meeting of the king and princess, although a ceremonious state function was none the less marked by unaffected joy and cordiality of the young monarch. The king presented his ministers who officially welcomed the bride to Spanish soil and she graciously acknowledged the official salutations. But the spontaneous enthusiasm of the people seemed to give the greater satisfaction to the king, who conducted the party to the royal train where the princess was installed in a luxurious coach.


IMPORTANT CHANGE IN PARLIAMENT OF RUSSIA

Goremykin Resigns—Prince Urusoff Made Minister of Interior.

Associated Press Cable to The Evening Times. St. Petersburg, May 25.—It was rumored in the lobbies of parliament this afternoon that Premier Goremykin had resigned and had been succeeded by M. Hippof of Moscow. It was also reported that Prince Urusoff, former assistant of the ministry of the interior, who resigned when the old council of the empire declined to accept his project to remove race and religion limits from the schools and who since has been elected to the lower house of parliament as a constitutional democrat from Kalvga, had been appointed minister of the interior.

APPLAUSE.

As each visitor was introduced to Moderator Corbett he stepped forward and the two clasped hands. When the ceremony was concluded there was scarcely a dry eye in the auditorium. The visitors were then presented to the assembly and each delivered a brief address expressing joy and gratitude at the consummation of the reunion of the two churches.
