



REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.
To the Republican Electors of the State of North Dakota:
In accordance with the instructions of the Republican State Central committee, a state convention of delegates, representatives of the republican party of this state is held this year at the opera house in the CITY OF JAMES-TOWN.

Thursday, July 12, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of nominating candidates to be supported at the next general election, and for the transaction of such other business as may be brought before it.
The candidates to be nominated are:
Two members of congress.
One judge of the supreme court.
Governor.
Lieutenant Governor.
Secretary of State.
State Treasurer.
Superintendent of Public Instruction.
Attorney General.
Commissioner of Insurance.
Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor.
Three Commissioners of Railroads.

Any new county, fully organized according to law prior to the holding of said convention, will be allowed two delegates at large.
The delegates present from each county at said convention are authorized to fill vacancies occurring in the delegation to which such county may be entitled, from residents of such county.
