CEREMONIES BEGUN IN HONOR OF WEDDING

Madrid Scene of Gay Crowds and Elaborate Plans for Nuptial Event.

At the Church of San Geronimo practically all preparations have been completed for the wedding ceremony.

A special bull fight is advertised for tomorrow afternoon at the Puerto de Sol.

Free dinners were given to several thousand poor people today. This charity will be repeated daily until May 31.

The police are taking rigorous precautions against any repetition of the previous attempts made on the life of King Alfonso.

The enormous and growing crowds and the babel of tongues may perhaps be considered so far to be the most striking features of the royal wedding festivities.

Toward night, when the working people leave the shops and factories, the crowd changes in aspect.

WRECKED

Train No. 5 on the Great Northern Derailed Near Bartlett at 11:35 Today While Going at Speed of 30 Miles an Hour.

CARS IN DITCH BUT NO ONE INJURED

Track Torn Up for 200 Feet and Wreck a Bad One—S. J. Small One of the Passengers.

FIVE SECONDS TOO SOON

Tiny Fraction of Time Decides Land Contest.

The effect of the decision is that Larson, because he was a five-seconds "sooner," loses his right to the land he had settled upon and also the improvements he made upon it.

TO DISSOLVE PARLIAMENT

Rumor that Premier Has Official Mandate Calling for Same.

St. Petersburg, May 26.—At 4 p. m. it is rumored in the corridors of the lower house of parliament that Premier Goremykin has in his pocket a mandate for the dissolution of parliament.

DISTRUST

Firm Tone of Goremykin's Speech Representing the Throne Produces Impression That Conflict is Inevitable.

LABOR PARTIES DRAW TWO RESOLUTIONS

Demanding Resignation of Parliament and Formation of a New and Responsible Ministry.

St. Petersburg, May 26.—Premier Goremykin's speech, which was unexpectedly firm in tone, produced such a vivid impression that a conflict is now considered inevitable.

It reiterated that a general amnesty was impossible, but promised the release, as rapidly as was possible, of those who had been arrested by administrative orders.

There could be no question, it was pointed out, of the abolition of the council of the empire, or the upper house, as an institution covered by fundamental law and its beyond the competence of parliament.

Most important of all, the premier declared that the basis for the solution of the agrarian problem proposed by the agrarians was completely impossible.

He promised, however, the distribution of some of the appendages of state domain's estate, as a reward for popular education, and as its laws and the institution of political liberty.

The resolution of the constitutional democrats, which was adopted at the caucus this morning, is as follows: "Inasmuch as the answer of the government contradicts the demands expressed in the address of the lower house of parliament, the party of the people's liberty, the 'constitutional democrats' express complete distrust in the cabinet and its immediate resignation and proceeds with the order of the day."

TELLTALE LETTERS

Wabash, Ind., May 26.—Arthur L. Hughes, a lawyer, said today that he has a large number of letters of O. A. Baker, who is in hiding to escape the effect of indictment on the charge of attempting to bribe the last legislature in connection with the passing of the anti-cigarette law.

The expectation that Premier Goremykin's statement would be utterly unfavorable caused great excitement at the opening of the lower house of parliament this afternoon.

THIRTY-FOUR INDICTMENTS

UPRISING

In the Provinces of Russia is Begun, Rival Agitators Being Armed and Prepared for Civil Warfare.

THE BLACK HUNDRED VS. REVOLUTIONISTS

One Man Waylaid and Murdered—Strikes and Acts of Violence Opening of the Conflict.

St. Petersburg, May 6.—Grave news comes from the provinces. Instead of acting as a sedative, the assuaging of parliament has been marked by the alarming increase in the revolutionary agitation and terroristic activity on the one hand and of "black hundred" activity on the other.

The extremists of both sides are thus divided into two hostile camps and both are arming as if preparing for an inevitable civil war.

Sanguinary conflicts continue to be reported. A sequel of the clash on Archangel square here May 4, when members of the black hundred fired fifty revolver shots, killing one man and seriously wounding three, came last night when a black hundred who participated in the affair was waylaid and murdered by social revolutionists.

Social democrats are working with might and main to cast discredit on parliament and produce an uprising of elementary forces. They have already participated in an incipient strike in the industrial quarters of Moscow and at Odessa the longshoremen have struck.

NEW YORK EXPRESS WRECKED EARLY TODAY
