THE LAW SAYS IMPOSSIBLE

School Books Can Not be Audited for Reason That Expense of Same is Not Provided for—Opinion of Attorney General Settles Matter of Authority.

Some time since the matter of auditing the school board books was agitated in this city. A mass meeting was called for the purpose of securing the opinion of the tax payers on the matter, but the meeting was not attended by a half dozen of those who had been most clamorous for the expenditure. The board investigated its authority for incurring the cost and was unable to find any law which would so authorize it. The law did provide for a reference of any doubtful matter to the state superintendent, who should secure an opinion from the attorney general. The board very wisely took this course. The opinion of the latter is given in full below. It is addressed to the state superintendent and specifically answers the question. It reads as follows:

The board of education of independent school district No. 3, in Polk county, Minnesota, hereby requests that you ask the attorney general for a written opinion as to whether or not the board of education has authority to employ an expert accountant to examine the financial condition of the books of the officers of that school district for a period covering the last ten years at a cost of \$15 per day, but not to exceed the total sum of \$500. The board is in doubt as to their authority to employ such expert or to appropriate such sum. The occasion for this request is the following:

Recently the books of the city of East Grand Forks were audited and a new system installed at the expense of \$1,800. A request on the part of some of the citizens of that city has been made to the board of education to have the books and financial affairs of the district for the past ten years audited by an expert accountant. There is no discovered shortage on the part of the treasurer or any other officer of the district which particularly requires an

COLLAPSE OF TRAMWAY

Laborers at Work Tearing Down Unburned Portion of Tramway Leading to Old Coal Shute, Have Narrow Escape From Death.

What came very nearly being a fatal accident occurred yesterday evening between 5 and 6 o'clock in the Great Northern railroad yards, when a section of raised track, 100 feet in length, from twenty-five to thirty feet above ground, leading to the coal shute which was recently destroyed by fire, fell to the ground, carrying with it several workmen.

A crew of men had been at work for the past two or three days tearing down the tramway and a weakening of the supports is presumed to have been responsible for the accident. One man had his back and shoulder wrenched and another jumped fifteen feet to escape being buried in the wreckage. That some of the men were not killed in a thirty-foot drop was indeed extraordinary.

It is the intention of the company to entirely clear away the present site of the coal sheds and the ground will ultimately be used for the network of tracks which will run to the site of the new freight depot. Work on that structure is progressing rapidly and the cement foundations are being rapidly laid.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES.

Johnston Firm of E. P. Cook & Co. Made Defendants in Suit.

Alex T. Turney, a former well-known farmer of Johnston, this county, now living in the Northwest Territory, has brought an action in the district court against E. P. Cook and John Carpenter, under the firm name of E. P. Cook & Co., for damages in the sum of \$10,000, charging malicious prosecution.

Mr. Turney asks \$5,000 actual damages and \$5,000 punitive damages. He claims that on April 23, 1904, the defendants, at the present action, instituted a suit against John Turney and Alex T. Turney for the recovery of \$251.80, alleged to be owing the firm. A warrant of attachment was served and two black horses, a wagon and a double set of harness were taken from Alex Turney just as he was about to leave for Canada, and he claims that they acted wilfully, maliciously and without probable cause and with intent and desire to injure, annoy, harass and hurt the plaintiff in this action, knowing that he was not indebted to the firm.

The action will be up for trial at the June term. J. H. Bosard for defendants and George A. Bangs for plaintiff.

SCHOOL ATHLETES VIEING FOR HONORS

Interscholastic Field Meet on at University Park This Afternoon.

This afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock at University Park, is being held the big interscholastic field meet contest between athletes of the various public school buildings of Grand Forks and East Grand Forks. The entries, which number nearly half a hundred, include some of the best juvenile athletes in the dual cities.

The schools that are in competition are the Central, Wilder, Belmont, Winship and East Grand Forks. The list of officials and entries have already been made public.

The meet, as has heretofore been noted, is held under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian association, and the honor for which the various schools are vying is the possession of a beautiful trophy cup, known as the "Palmer prize," and presented by A. E. Palmer, the well-known Third street jeweler. The rules of the contest are so framed that in order for a school to come into absolute possession of the trophy, that school must have won the meet three consecutive times. This rule makes necessary the holding of a field meet every year. The probability of the ownership of the prize being permanent vested within three years is unlikely, with so many schools and different athletes contending.
