TRAINS 111-112 ANYHOW

And Perhaps 35 and 36 Will be Provided for Grand Forks in Proposed New Time Card to be Promulgated by Great Northern on June 3.

Supt. Macy Nicholson of this division of the Great Northern returned this morning from St. Paul, where he has been in conference with other railway officials in the consideration of the proposed new time-card which it is expected will be promulgated about June 3. If the venture of this morning's Herald that the new card will give Grand Forks four new trains is true, it would be a fine thing for Grand Forks, but, according to Supt. Nicholson, who, perhaps, knows as much and a little more than anyone else in local circles about the proposed new card, it is scarcely probable that Grand Forks will be so well favored.

"While I am not in a position at the present time to announce definitely what we will get in the new card," said Supt. Nicholson, "we will be safe in stating that we will get two new trains, No. 111 and 112 from Fargo to Larimore and return. The extension of the runs of 35 and 36, Duluth locals, from Crookston to this city is improbable. It is one thing for officials to discuss proposed changes but quite another thing to promulgate them—railroad employes and newspapers can construct time-cards much more easily than can the railroads."

Even should the rumor of the extension of the runs of 35 and 36 from Crookston to this city fall, Grand Forks will be well favored in the establishing of Trains 111 and 112 which, according to a preliminary schedule received by Agent Sinclair, will run daily excepting Sundays, leaving Larimore at 7 a. m., arriving here at 6 and departing for Fargo at 8:30. Returning, the train will leave Fargo at 8:15 p. m., reaching here at 10:45 and Larimore at 11:40.

Another change which it is believed will be made in the new cards is in trains 9 and 10, now running between Grand Forks and St. Paul by way of Fargo and the Breckenridge division. These trains will be run from Grand Forks to St. Paul over the Barnesville division, by way of Crookston. Train 9 will leave Grand Forks at 11 o'clock at night, and will reach St. Paul about 10 o'clock the following morning. Train 10 will run on about the same time as the present Train 5, and will arrive here from St. Paul about 7:45 in the morning.

Trains 5 and 6 will run through from Williston to St. Paul over the Breckenridge and Willmar divisions, and will arrive here at 10:45 and Larimore at 11:40.
