park, with its numerous cascades and lakes, supplied with water from huge reservoirs. These water-works are really the most remarkable feature of La Grana, and the effect of the fountains is much more grand than at Versailles. In the fountain of Perseus, who rescues Andromeda from the dragon, the latter throws a jet of 100 feet in the air. The basket fountain consists of numerous jets, 40 to 65 feet high, and the jet of the Panna fountain, 115 feet high, can be seen at Segovia. The "Bath of Diana" is a chaos of water spouts and statues of goddesses and nymphs, glorifying the triumph of the loving woman, appearing in her whole beauty.

Church of San Jeronimo at Real. The church of San Jeronimo at Real, where the nuptial mass is celebrated and the marriage benediction pronounced, is a quaint old structure which has passed through some strange vicissitudes. This is not the first royal marriage celebrated there, for the wedding of Isabella II. took place in great pomp within its walls. But more recently the church was abandoned to a carpenter's shop and planing mill, and the whirl of saws took the place of the solemn measures of the mass.

The origin of the church was one of the strange whims of the old king of Castile, Henry IV. He had set up a magnificent tournament on the Pardo road, to celebrate the arrival of a new British ambassador. The tournament was notable for the courage displayed by the king's favorite, Beltran de la Cueva, who not only unhorsed four knights, but also single-handedly, and on horseback, with a small javelin, conquered and killed an infuriated bull which had torn to pieces the greatest terrors of Spain. The king to commemorate this event founded a monastery, which the Jeronimo friars inaugurated. Later Isabella, the Catholic, shifted the site of the monastery to its present place. Here it became the Royal chapel, and during the gay era of Philip IV. all the royal alliances and coronations took place there. At another time the Cortes met there.

After the expulsion of the friars the edifice became an artillery magazine and later a carpenter establishment. Thus it remained a workshop until in 1880 the government resolved to restore the building to its original object as a royal chapel. The saw-mills were then removed, and extensive remodeling and repairing gave it back some of its former glory. The style of the church is gothic, with two small towers, and a large gothic portico with rich stone carvings. The interior has the form of a cross, with a rose window throwing a soft light across the altar. There are few artistic treasures within, and the scant light from the dusty stained-glass windows makes the interior rather dark.

Moreover, it is essentially a chapel, rather than a magnificent cathedral, and it lacks that splendid perspective fitting a state ceremony. However its dark walls are now hung with magnificent tapestries, while thousands of plants and flowers and burning candles give a setting worthy of this solemn act.

San Jeronimo is the only church in Spain where mass can be celebrated after midday. This results from an indulgence granted for a fortune bequeathed to the church by a centurion with a rich dowager in favor of the maid servant. The dowager's precious jewels disappeared one day, and the servant being accused she was tortured and executed with all the horrors of inquisition days. Later the jewels were discovered in the adjoining park, in a nest of maples. The grief of the dowager was boundless, and she gave her whole fortune for requiems, the indulgence for afternoon masses following some years after.

The Bridal Trousseau. Except the wedding dress, all the bridal trousseau of robes, cloaks, evening and tea gowns, petticoats and underlinen, was made in London where many of the dresses have been on exhibition. Some of the articles of this queenly trousseau are described as follows: A dainty dress of white mousseline-de-soie flowered with roses. A morning gown is of fine spotted lawn over palest blue. Inset with Valenciennes lace. A beautiful princess robe is in spotted lawn, made to wear over many different colored slips. A charming pale blue China-silk. Embroidered morning robe is fastened front with blue rosettes and ends. Another morning gown is of white lawn over pale blue, inserted at equal distances with Valenciennes lace. A smart morning gown is composed entirely of English embroidery in a very open-work design.

Among the simple day gowns are many composed of linen. The bodices in many instances are made after the American bolero styles with touches of red and blue. One of the most of the many dressing jackets is made of the palest blue and white zennana edged with quaint silk embroidery. A handsome day dress is composed of ivory crepe de chine, the bodice arranged with the finest purple lace and tucked squares of crepe de chine, the centres of which are delicately embroidered with colored rosebuds and set together with insertions of valenciennes lace. A simple frock in the palest pink and white flowered voile with valenciennes lace. Another day dress is of pale pink and white satin foulard in a small design. Another beautiful visiting dress is of fine white valenciennes lace and ivory crepe de chine.

Among the many tea gowns is a beautiful one of palest pink mousseline de soie, made in the empire style. Another is a pale yellow empire gown veiled with white Hon-de-soie. The large bell sleeves are entirely of frills of lace, and round the short waist are pale yellow ribbons threaded through embroidery. There is a handsome evening coat of pale biscuit-colored faced cloth, with a hood composed of valenciennes lace, dyed and lined with the cloth. Among the evening gowns is a short waisted one of pale mauve mousseline. Another empire evening gown is of white silk mousseline, flowered all over with tiny clusters of pink roses.

The underlinen is made of the finest Hon trimmed with real valenciennes lace and fine embroidery. The initials of the royal bride surmounted by the Spanish crown are worked on all the garments.

The Wedding Fetes. The fetes for the king's wedding have been prepared on an unusual scale of lavishness. They are divided in three parts, the first including the family fetes celebrated at the royal palace by the members of the royal family; second, the fetes offered to the visiting princes, envoys and high functionaries; and, third, the popular fetes organized for the people. These begin on the wedding day, lasting a week or more. The royal fetes include banquets, dinners, and a grand

ball to which only the representatives of royal houses having family alliances with Spain are bidden. The official fetes to foreign envoys and high functionaries include reception and banquet at the royal palace; the Royal Theatre, reception and ball at the hotel de ville, and many other entertainments for the distinguished guests.

By far the most interesting fetes are those in which the people participate, including night illuminations of the Prado and other public quarters. A Venetian feast at the West park, three bull fights, a luminous cortege, a battle of flowers, and a procession of all the Spanish provinces, in typical groups and figures, in order that the Queen may see the Spanish people from every quarter of the country.

The program of the luminous cortege gives an idea of the extent and splendor of the popular fetes. Its main features are: Two great decorative floats with the portraits of the king and queen. Two artistic pyramids with figures representing the Spanish provinces supporting the arms of Spain and Battenburg.

A beautiful gallery of orange flowers, transparent and luminous, liberty style. A float containing 20 monster flambeaus, with the monograms of Alfonso and Ena, surmounted by royal crowns.

Three pyramids of flowers and colored lights (105 persons). Flambeau surrounding the portrait of the Queen Mother. A pyramid formed by 10 galleries (100 persons).

Flambeau with the portrait of king Edward with British banners and arms. Twenty floats giving Spanish history in allegorical designs (100 persons).

Fifty floats with the arms of the principal Spanish towns. Sixteen floats bearing Spanish and British banners. Seven enormous luminous letters spelling: Alfonso; Alfonso. Eight enormous luminous letters spelling: Victoria.

Two great royal crowns of 20 feet diameter. Eight great decorative floats (each transported by 100 persons). A great float formed by the arms of Spain and Battenburg surrounded by thousands of people from the personal of these floats. Besides those mentioned, there are many representing huge pantries, roses and lilies. The luminous inscriptions breathe welcome to the new queen and long life to the royal couple--Vive la reina

The Royal Bullfight. The programme for the royal bullfight is unusually elaborate, for besides four ordinary contests there are to be four more by "caballeros en place." The presents for King Alfonso and his bride are arriving from all quarters of the globe, from countries and their rulers, from provinces and cities, and even from school children of Spain who have contributed their mite to show their loyalty to the king. Some of these gifts are as follows: The queen mother presents the king with her portrait painted by Moreno Carbonero. The city of Madrid gives an enduring present to the bride, by establishing a workmen's quarter which is baptised in the name of "Queen Victoria Eugenia." The mayor of Madrid has invited all the mayors of Spain to sign an artistic album expressing their homages to the young couple. The manufacturers of Barcelona have presented the bride with a diadem of diamonds valued at 150,000 pesetas.

The presents from royalty are notable mainly for their elegance and taste, rather than their intrinsic worth, although some of them are of great value. The emperor of Germany sends some splendid hunting trophies, made of the heads of wild boars and stags which Alfonso killed during his hunt

fighting on horseback against a bull. He killed the bull, and was rewarded on the spot by being restored to royal favor, the king taking off his own sword and presenting it to him. The Plaza de Toros is one of the most splendid amphitheatres in Europe, easily seating 15,000 to 20,000 people, while the crowd packed within has at times reached 100,000. It is in the Morrish style, with an enormous entrance gate, which looks in the distance like the Arc de Triomphe in Paris. The arena has a diameter of 315 feet, and all about this rise tier on tier of galleries and boxes, many of them bearing the arms of noble families, with the royal box occupying a commanding position.

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
