Grand Forks Shooters Had Poor Luck in Tournament at Fargo.

Messrs. W. B. Wood, Geo. E. Duis, E. C. Cooper and V. Fletcher have returned home from Fargo, where they went early in the week to participate in the North Dakota state sportsmen's tournament which closed last evening at Fargo.

Three teams participated in the state championship team event yesterday. The scores were as follows: Bismarck—LaMoure 20, Rial 21, O'Connor 22, Dr. Quain 21; total 84.

Fargo—C. E. Robbins 21, Dr. F. H. Bailey 23, L. Backer 22, Jensen 17; total 83.

Grand Forks—Wood 15, Cooper 22, Fletcher 20, Duis 21; total 78.

The state individual championship was won by D. C. Rand of Jamestown. The prize is a gold badge valued at \$50.

Event No. 11 of the first day was finished yesterday and F. H. Sprague of Grafton won, making 24 out of 25 targets.

The largest run during the tournament was made by C. E. Robbins of Fargo, who shot straight through events 2, 3 and 5 of 15 shots each.

The weather conditions were unfavorable for high scores, owing to the cross wind. The general averages of the win-

CONDEMN THE MUCK-RAKER. President Van Dyke Tells Princeton Meet to Be "Awake and Sane."

Princeton, N. J., June 15.—Baccalaureate sermon of Princeton's commencement was delivered in Alexander hall by Dr. Henry Van Dyke.

Dr. Van Dyke spoke on "The Contagion of Virtue," taking his text from Philippians, iv: 3—"If there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think of these things." He said the lightning of exposure has been striking in dark places and playing havoc

with houses that were founded upon lies. Voices of despair are heard, he said, "crying that all is rotten. On the other side," he said, "conservative and soothing voices are heard protesting against the tempest."

He admonished the graduating class to take their stand with those who are both awake and sane; those who desire that no good men shall go unpunished, as earnestly as they wish, that no guilty man shall go unpunished. He condemned the "muck-taker," and said: "If, indeed, the age be critical, suspicious, censorious, let us then strengthen ourselves by the contagion of virtue to play the better part. Let us cast our lot not with the destroyers, but with the fulfillers."


