A new petition will be presented at the next meeting of the board on July 2. This will ask for the annexation of a part of 52 to 75 and will, in all probability, be granted.

OFFICIOUS DEPUTY.

Promises Escaped Prisoner Immunity From Law and Gets Arrested Himself.

Minot, June 15.—John Skinner, of Flaxton, was arrested Thursday for contempt of court and brought to Minot and arraigned before Judge Goss. His hearing will take place next week and meanwhile he is under a bond of \$1,000 in default of which he will be placed in the county jail. It seems that Skinner was one of the deputy sheriffs of Ward county and last fall assisted in raiding some of the blind pigs at Flaxton. One pigger by the name of Ford escaped arrest and went to Canada. Skinner saw Ford at several times in Canada and told him that he would fix matters all right so that he could return to the United States without being arrested and so obtained \$25 at one time for that purpose and then he induced Ford to deed to him a lot which he owned in Flaxton and in return for this he would see that he (Ford) would not be arrested if he returned to the United States. In his dealings with Ford he represented himself to be a special deputy sheriff appointed by Judge Goss and had greater powers than the regular deputy. But Skinner was caught in his game and he will now have to deal with Judge Goss on a charge of criminal contempt.

Roscoe C. Sutcliffe, who has fought child labor so successfully for 16 years, said recently in Dallas:

KANE GUILTY

Jury Agrees on Petit Larceny Instead of Grand Larceny Verdict.

The jury in the case of the state vs. James Kane, the trial of which was concluded today, brought in a verdict this morning of petit larceny. Kane was the man who stole a harness valued at about \$25 from J. P. Kennedy of this city a short time ago. He was charged with the crime of grand larceny.

The civil case of Maud Kirby—Cochrane vs. H. P. Cooper is now on trial and will probably take up the rest of the day. Mrs. Cochrane has been on the stand in her own behalf during the morning session, giving way this afternoon to the defense.

This is an action in which the plaintiff sues for wages claimed to be owing. Defendant makes denial.

LARRON IN MORE TROUBLE.

Now on Trial for Grand Larceny—To Face Still Another Charge.

Yesterday at Washburn Alexander Larron was placed on trial for grand larceny in stealing a fur overcoat. Attorney Austin of Ellendale, was granted a change of venue for Larron and the case will probably be tried at Bismarck the next term of court. Attorney Austin, on his arrival at the capitol from Washburn, was handed a wire saying that Larron had been arrested on the charge of bringing stolen property into McLean county, so the attorney returned to Washburn. It will be remembered that Larron was tried recently at Fargo on extradition charges brought by the Canadian government, but was released and at once arrested by the McLean county sheriff on the charge of grand larceny. Larron served a term of three years in the pen for horse stealing, and it was on such a charge the Canadians wanted him.
