U. N. D WILL TACKLE WISCONSIN AT FOOTBALL

Flickertails Placed on Badger State University Football Schedule.

Graduate Manager Angell, of the Wisconsin university football team, has completed his schedule of games to be played by that institution next season. For the first time in its history North Dakota has a place on Wisconsin's date card and will go to Madison to buck the Badgers October 27. Wisconsin has no really heavy games scheduled for next year, the only universities being Iowa, North Dakota, Illinois and Purdue. The Wisconsin rosters characterize the schedule of games as "Mild Amusement for the Badgers."

The athletic authorities at the university have not yet been notified as to whether or not North Dakota will play Minnesota, the regular game on the 7th of October. If not, the Wisconsin trip will be the only eastern trip undertaken by the Flickertail athletes. However, a contract with the South Dakota Agricultural college at Brookings, S. D., has been drawn up and signed so that at least one other good out-of-town game is assured. The Winnipeg Shamrocks, according to their custom, are asking for a game, but playing the soccer game as they do, it is hardly possible that anything will come of their petition. They are anxious that one game of the American rugby be played in Winnipeg and a return game of the English soccer be played in this city, thus giving the rooters of both cities something new to look upon.

G. N. IS LUCKY

Numerous Bad Wrecks But Very Few Fatalities--

Reasons Given.
"Great Northern luck" has come to be an accepted phrase in railroad circles in the northwest. During the past year or two, out of nearly a dozen, what in the natural phraseology would be called "bad wrecks," the fatalities have either been nil, or else not more than one or two where from circumstances surrounding that particular accident, one would expect a large number of people killed or badly maimed.
For example: Eight weeks ago Train 7, the Winnipeg express, bound from St. Paul to the 'Peg, while running at a speed estimated at 40 miles an hour, jumped the track near St. Cloud, Minn. Every coach in the train of

nine cars but one, went off in the ditch and before the mad tear ended, wound up in a corn field fully fifty feet from the track. Not only that but the cars passed down a declivity ten feet deep and snapped off two telephone poles and tore down eight or twenty fence posts. The engine remained on the track but broke loose from the tender which crashed through a bridge throwing out the engineer and fireman who had taken refuge therein. The engine, however, continued on a mad tear and was found the next morning twenty miles from the scene of the accident. The most wonderful feature of the accident was that not a single, solitary person was as much as scratched, where ordinarily a heavy loss of life would be expected.

Again: Not more than four weeks ago Train 5, St. Paul to Minot, was ditched between Lakota and Bartlett while running thirty miles an hour. The baggage, mail cars and smoker were hurled down an embankment and one of the day coaches derailed. A steel rail, loosened by the engine's tender, passed entirely through the baggage car. The coaches overturned landed in several feet of water in a ditch. When the inventory was taken no one was found to be injured. These are but two instances of "Great Northern luck."

Mr. Sinclair, the company's local agent, in discussing these recent "fortuitous" accidents, assigned superior car construction as one of the main reasons why wrecks were not causing the loss of life that was formerly the invariable result. "All our passenger cars nowadays are built with steel seats, bottoms and vestibules. This has the effect of preventing telescoping and makes the cars more indestructible. That is the entire reason in a nut-shell."

Grand Forks people join the officers of the road in hoping for the company that "Great Northern luck" may become an established phrase in the conversation of railroad men and citizens who have to make use of the line.

HEMORRHAGE

Causes the Demise Last Night of Mrs. Ellen Storrs, Aged 66 Years.

Mrs. Ellen Storrs, aged 66, mother of Mrs. Thomas Lynch of this city, died at the home of her daughter and son-in-law at 117 N. Sixth street last night at 8 o'clock after a brief illness. The direct cause of death was a hemorrhage. In addition to the daughter residing in this city, Mrs. Storrs leaves two sons and one daughter to mourn her death. Her oldest son resides at Faribault, Minn., and the other daughter at Morris. Mrs. Storrs has been in this city for some time, her husband having died five years ago at Graceville, Minn. The remains will be sent to that place tonight and will be accompanied by Mrs. Lynch, who will arrange for the interment.

PLACE CHECK UPON N. D. INSURANCE COMPANIES

Commissioner Cooper Rules Against Issuance of Special Contracts in This State.

The State Life Insurance company of Indianapolis, Ind., which was refused a license some time ago by State Insurance Commissioner E. C. Cooper to do business in North Dakota, it was announced today has complied with the regulations of the department and has been relicensed. At the time of the refusal of license the company thought itself secure in this state and when asked for certain information by the state insurance department, it promptly refused.

Mr. Cooper, always looking out for the interests of the people of the state, has made a new ruling which will check discrimination on the part of the insurance companies to some extent. Hereafter no company will be allowed to issue what are termed "special contracts." The companies now issuing them will be asked to discontinue the practice and all companies coming into the state will be refused license to do so. The reason for this ruling is summed up by the statement made by Mr. Cooper today when he said: "I take the position that the issuing of special contracts is a discrimination and conflicts with our anti-trust laws. In reality it is a rebate."

PARALLEL SOO

Great Northern to Build to Crosby by Way of Berthold and Bowbells.

Information of a reliable nature received in this city this morning is to the effect that the Great Northern will in a short time begin the construction of a branch line out of Berthold, N. D., northwest, paralleling the Soo as far as Bowbells and angling straight west from that point to Crosby, a new town in Williams county.

The proposed branch will tap some of the best country in the counties of Ward and Williams. Such a line is badly needed.
