STATE CROP REPORT.
Furnished by the Observer at Bismarck—Weather Unfavorable.
Bismarck, N. D., June 23.—The weather of the past week was very unfavorable, the sky as a rule being overcast with clouds and this condition resulted in precipitation in parts of the section on each day of the week. While the rainfall was in no case excessive, yet reports show that the precipitation was general throughout the state. The heaviest rainfall occurred in the eastern portion of the section, Hamilton, Pembina county, reporting the greatest amount, 2.20 inches. Hallstones were quite common, but the damage reported was slight. The average rainfall for the state was below the normal, the daily departures ranging from—.08 inch at Bismarck, to—.05 inch at Williston.
The average daily temperature throughout the state during the past week was about 10 degrees below the normal, due principally to low maximum temperatures, caused by excessive cloudiness. The highest temperature reported was 85 degrees, at Jamestown on the 19th, and Williston on the 22nd. Temperatures below 40 degrees were quite general. The lowest being 23 degrees, at Williston on the 21st, where light frost was reported. No damage, however, resulted from low temperatures.
The winds were generally moderate throughout the week with the prevailing direction from the northwest. No damage was reported from high winds.

COUNT NOSES
Insurgent Leaders Meet at Valley City to Fix Slate and Take Stock.
A dispatch from Valley City dated the 27th says: Yesterday morning Editor Winship of the Herald, Hon. M. N. Johnson and Senator Kraabel arrived here to hold a conference of the leaders of the insurgents, to decide on a slate for the state convention. The utmost secrecy was displayed in this movement, and the insurgents here even had not been notified of the proposed meeting. Ex-Governor White was absent from the city and other leaders of the movement knew nothing about the gathering until the arrival of these distinguished visitors. Ex-Congressman Spalding was unavoidably absent, because of being in St. Paul to meet his daughter, who was on her way home. The gentlemen adjourned their conference until evening to secure the presence of some of their local friends. Then the matters to come before the state convention were gone over and a tentative program laid out. It is reported it was decided to spring a surprise on the arrival of these many local candidates for the various offices as possible in each county, especially for governor, and in the end probably unite for Mr. Johnson for the place, though he denied that he wished to be a candidate. The program was gone over as carefully as possible and it was decided to send emissaries into each county to try and keep up the spirits of the insurgents, and to get them to support the cut and dried program which was outlined for the coming convention.
In accord with the agreement to spring as many candidates for governor as possible in the various counties, Mr. Twichel announces today that T. A. Quirk of Buffalo is to be their candidate for governor, but he does not say that other candidates are to be sprung. Those present thought that Mr. Quirk would "loosen up" better than Mr. Lynch, and he was therefore selected for the sacrifice in this vicinity. Mr. Quirk is too good a man to be held in this way. He would have no show of winning, even if the insurgents did not carry out their plan to spring a candidate in almost every county in the state.
It appears that Mr. Spalding reached Valley City last evening and Mr. Twichel was also in the conference. Mr. Winship declared that he did not want to have his name used for governor at this time unless he had a dead sure chance of winning, and under the circumstances he preferred that some one else make the sacrifice. Mr. Spalding objected to the office of senator being promised to Marshall for two years hence, as he desired that post himself, but he was persuaded to keep still as even if Marshall fell into the trap, many things might happen in two years so that it would not be necessary to keep the promise even if they were in position to do so. Will Be Solid Floor.
In the construction of the new freight depot here the Great Northern has determined upon a flooring with gravel foundation. The main floor will be about five or six feet above ground and the entire inner walls beneath this will be filled with gravel, so that the joists may rest thereon. This will give a floor that will be less noisy and at the same time more durable. It is estimated that three hundred car-loads of "filling" will be necessary for the work. Under the office portion of the depot there will be a basement, however, in which old records can be stored away.

RICHLAND O. K.
Official Count Shows Stalwart Victory by Safe Majority—19 Delegates Elected.
Wahpeton, N. D., June 23.—The official count of the election returns completed last evening shows that the regular republican delegates were all elected, the lowest majority received by a stalwart delegate over the highest insurgent being 16. Other majorities run as high as 50 and over. The insurgents have been claiming Richland county but it was known all along that the regular republicans had won a victory over the disruptionists although the majorities are larger and the victory more decided than was expected. This gives the stalwarts 19 additional votes in the state convention.
