Meanwhile a new vice presidential possibility has loomed up. When Mayor McClellan sailed for Europe a week ago not even the most suggestive of the suggesting school of politicians offered the suggestion that he had gone across the water and that he was deliberately planning to meet William Jennings Bryan. However, the thought is now being advanced that the next democratic national ticket will read Bryan and McClellan.

"ANARCHIST" IS HARMLESS

August Rosenberg Suspected of Designs Upon Emperor's Life as a Student.

Seattle, Wash., July 7.—A central committee of united German societies of Seattle at its regular meeting last night declared that August Rosenberg, arrested in Germany upon suspicion of being an anarchist with designs against the life of Emperor William, was nothing but a harmless minor of pains. The letter which caused the arrest of Rosenberg, the members of the society claim, was written by an enemy of Rosenberg to the authorities in the fatherland.

RUSSIAN LINE TO NEW YORK

HOW SCIENCE HAS ADVANCED

Dr. Andrew D. White Tells of Student Days at Yale.

Associated Press to The Evening Times. Ithaca, N. Y., July 7.—The closing session of the American Association for the Advancement of Science was held this week in Barnes hall. Dr. Andrew D. White, former president of Cornell university, described his first attendance at a meeting of the association, fifty years ago, in the summer of 1856 at Albany. The occasion was the opening of the Dudley observatory and was a general glorification of science. Such eminent men as Argers-son, Everett, Bancroft, Henry and Beard were the speakers.

FOR BIG BATTLESHIP

Invitation Issued to Builders to Submit Plans for the Same.

Washington, July 7.—Secretary Bonaparte has issued a circular inviting ship designers and ship building firms to submit plans for a 20,000 ton battleship, authorized by congress. The naval bureau has also been instructed to prepare like plans for comparison with those submitted by private bidders. The preliminary plans are to be submitted by November 1, next.

TO DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Tucker was electrocuted a month ago at the Charlestown prison a second murderer will be put to death early Monday morning. The condemned man is John Schildofski, a Lithuanian, who murdered his wife at Belmont, July 12 last year. After the crime he was found in Colorado some six months afterward. His defense at the trial was insanity.

CHINKS' PLOT TO MURDER

Is Unearthed at Coroner's Inquest—Highbinders Marked Proposed Victims.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 7.—Sensational testimony was offered today at the coroner's inquest in the case of Dong Soo, the Chinaman who died from a gunshot wound received during a factional fight in Chinatown on the night of July 4. Lee Toy, who was long known as the "mayor of Chinatown," testified that the recent meeting of the band of "highbinders" several men were marked for assassination, among them Rev. Frederick Poole, an Episcopal missionary, who is located in the Chinese district. Mr. Poole was shot during the disturbance on July 4 and is now in the hospital. Lee Toy stated that the murders were to be committed during the celebration of Independence day. He further testified that he saw Jung Gow fire at Dong Soo.

MONSTER HAIL STONES

As Large as Oranges Wreck Houses and Cause Death in Spain.

Hail stones as big as oranges smashed the roofs of houses, causing the inhabitants to take refuge in the cellars. The crops in many districts were destroyed and great distress prevails. TOO REALISTIC

Philadelphia, Pa., July 7.—Two colored boys who were impersonating chicken thieves for the benefit of some moving picture men along York road, had a bad quarter of an hour yesterday with some residents in that vicinity, who took the make-believers for reality and visited the supposed culprits with condign punishment in the shape of sundry cuffs and blows. As a result one of the boys, Philip Johnson, 13 years old, had one rib broken and his scalp lacerated.

The picture men, representing a New York company, made a contract with Elihu P. Shirley, on York road to use his place as the theater of the imaginary raid on the chicken yard. Each with a squaking fowl under his arm, Johnson and a companion ran down the road from the ostensibly plundered chicken house, while the picture men chased them in counterfeit rage. The affair was so realistic that some neighbors, in righteous indignation, fell upon the luckless boys and pummeled them until they were rescued by the picture men.

JUDGE LANDIS DELAYS SENTENCE

Arrives at Oyster Bay for Consultation With President Upon Important Matters of State.

SPEECH IN POCKET FOR CONSIDERATION

He Will Go Over Carolina Republican Speech With Roosevelt Before Its Delivery.

Oyster Bay, L. I., July 7.—Secretary of War Taft came to Oyster Bay today to spend a few hours with President Roosevelt. In the absence from Washington of the president and Secretary Root, the secretary of war has again assumed many additional cares of state. "I have a large number of matters to go over with the president and have a very short time to do it in," remarked the secretary as he took his seat in the president's carriage and inquired how far it was to Sagamore Hill. The secretary has with him a speech he will deliver Monday night at the North Carolina republican state convention at Greensboro. He will go over the speech with the president. "I have this speech to make and then a trip to Ohio and then it is over," remarked the secretary. "And then I shall take a good rest for two months."

BULGARIA MAY YET CHANGE TO A KINGDOM

But Long Cherished Hope of Prince Ferdinand is Still Unrealized.

Vienna, July 7.—Nineteen years ago today, Ferdinand of Coburg was elected Reining Prince of Bulgaria by the national assembly. The anniversary finds him apparently as far removed as ever from a realization of his ambition to have Bulgaria proclaimed independent and himself elevated to the kingship. Prince Ferdinand recently sent his premier Gen. Petroff to those European chancelleries personally interested in the status of the Balkan principality to gain for concrete the proclamation of Bulgarian independence. The mission was a failure. At the same time the European cabinets regarded the aspirations of the prince as "too big" with growing concern, as they recognize that he might any day set fire to the Balkan powder barrel and cause an international conflagration.

PEARY'S

Search for the North Pole Has Probably Cost Him His Life and That of the Crew on Ill-Fated Ship.

NO NEWS FROM HIM FOR YEAR

Expedition Started July 16, 1905—Vigorous Season Made Dangers Doubly Serious.

Washington, July 7.—That Capt. Robert E. Peary has sacrificed his life in an effort to discover the north pole is the fear of naval men here, who are worried by the failure to get any tidings of the ship Roosevelt which sailed for the Arctic regions July 16, 1905. Advice from the American Geographical society and to their fear. Reports are that the weather in the far north this spring and early summer was more than usually vigorous, that several storms have been frequent and that the ice is heavy. Consequently, it is feared that Peary's ship may have been ground to pieces by the drifting floes.

KOMURA TO VISIT CANADA

RAN THROUGH PARK ENVELOPED IN FLAMES

Explosion of Package of Peroxide of Soda in Man's Pocket the Cause.
