H. D. Fruit who is serving a term in the penitentiary for burglarizing a Lakota store, was indicted by the federal grand jury for robbing the post office at Lakota. He will be tried for the latter so soon as discharged from the pen.

The Mohall News says hired help, male as well as female, is a very scarce article at this time. At least two hundred persons could secure employment in and around Mohall and when the harvesting and threshing season comes probably one thousand persons will be needed to dispose of the crop, from present prospects. House maids are now receiving from three to four dollars per week and many places vacant for lack of sufficient supply.

Lightning hit the house of J. E. Miller at Minot, and after doing some acrobatic stunts, ran down the post of the iron bed upon which Miller was sleeping. His head was within four inches of the post but he was not hurt.

A team ran away at the ball game at Sherwood and Miss Maggie Irvin was thrown from the buggy and seriously injured.

The Carrington Independent is agitating an electric or a gasoline railroad to McHenry.

Merl postoffice was discontinued on June 30th. Mail for parties in that locality is now being sent to Nekoma and Fairdale, two new towns along the Soo line of railroad.

Over at Munich the base ball nines are known as the "Insurgents," and the "Regulars."

June in Jamestown was certainly a month of wonders, twenty-one licenses being issued during the month with four in one day.

Glenla township in Cavalier county will build a consolidated school at Calvin during the present summer at a cost of \$5,000.

Loring W. Jordan, who has a homestead northeast of Crosby, near Long Creek, and upon which he offered final proof some two years ago, is under arrest by the federal authorities, charged with perjury in connection with his final proof.

Ralph Payne, an employe on the Brown farm at Grandin, was kicked in the head by a horse last week and severely injured.

A man named Plumm, living one and one-half miles west of Buttzville, suicided by taking strychnine. He has a fine farm, good crop prospects, a wife and six children and is only 36 years old. He gave as his reason that he was tired of living, and refused to take antidotes from the doctor.

The Union blind pig case, in which the pigger brought action against a minister and others to recover damages for the destruction of his place of business by setting it on fire, reached a close Tuesday forenoon. The jury brought in a verdict awarding Barlow, the pigger, damages in the amount of \$40. He wanted \$400.

Hotel Men in Session. Associated Press to The Evening Times. Chicago, Ill., July 9. - The annual meeting of the Hotel Men's Mutual Benefit association began in this city today, and will continue Thursday. Prominent hotel men from many parts of the United States and Canada are in attendance. The bonfires will discuss numerous matters of mutual interest, among them being plans for the further suppression of the "dead beat" evil.

Inspecting Lines. Davis of Minot is making a trip of inspection over the line in a motor car, fitted with railroad wheels. This machine enables him to carefully inspect the entire roadbed, stopping just as long as necessary in any place, and looking over bridges and culverts. Some three weeks were spent in Montana, and it will take some five weeks more to complete the work in this state.

Tramways in Minneapolis. Tremendous yard developments are planned for Minneapolis by two big railroad systems, the Northern Pacific and the Soo line, too keep pace with the growth of the city and the western territory which is tributary to it. The deals involve the purchase of hundreds of acres of land and the immediate utilization of the land in facilitating the handling of traffic.

In the case of the Northern Pacific it means the erection of a round house and the establishment of eastern terminals for all freight trains, where the traffic will be
