CHECK FORGERY WAS VERY CLEVERLY DONE

M. Stanchfield Has Name Put on Check by Stranger—Police Investigating.

A clever forgery was perpetrated on M. Stanchfield Saturday evening, though he fortunately did not lose the money. During the early evening a barber by the name of Christine presented a check for \$17 to the J. B. Busch saloon on Minnesota point, which purported to have been executed to Charles Anderson by M. Stanchfield the clothier. Busch looked at the signature which so resembled that of Stanchfield that it would be difficult to detect and as he also knew Christine, took the check without question. This morning he discovered that Christine had not endorsed it and he at once became suspicious. He inquired of Stanchfield as to whether or not he had issued such a check and was informed that he had not. The check was drawn on the Union National bank of this city and the blank used had the blank date 189—, which was cancelled and the date 1906 written above. The date was July 7, and the check number 236. Anderson had endorsed it on the back at the name there and in the body of the check were almost exactly alike. Mr. Stanchfield has never kept any account at the Union National bank and has never had a bank book from that institution. Christine could not be found today and nothing could be learned as to who Anderson was or how the former came in possession of the same.

LOGIE CASE FILED. Some Sensations May Develop at The Trial of the Case.

The complaint in the anticipated action of A. E. Logie against the board of education of Fargo, to recover \$2,400 was filed in the office of the clerk of the federal court late Saturday. The complaint sets forth the facts surrounding the rescinding of the contract made with Mr. Logie to act as superintendent of schools. It was hinted by Seth W.
