RAILROAD NEWS NOTES

BORING FOR OIL AT MEDICINE HAT

C. P. E. Starts to Sink 14-Inch Hole to Depth of 2,500 Feet. Medicine Hat, Alta. July 28.—The Canadian Pacific is starting, at this point, one of the greatest undertak-ings in western Canada. The company will make a test to ascertain whether or not there is oil underlying the natural gas field. Where there is gas there is oil appears to be the assump-tion, and Medicine Hat people hope that the railway company will be able to prove the truth of this maxim. Last week, nine car loads of drilling ma-chinery arrived at Medicine Hat, con-sisting of modern cable rigged drill-ing outfit and drill pipes of various diameters, from fourteen inches down, sufficient to reach the depth of 3,500 feet. The drill is a modern one and capable of fast work and will be the first cable rig to work in this field. The greatest depth that ever has been reached in this field is 1,010 feet, where a tremendous flow of natural gas was found. The present opera-tors will go if necessary, 2,350 feet deeper. This test should certainly ascertain what there is down below and the result of the test, if oil is found, will mean as much to Medi-cine Hat as the great gas find a few years ago. The work is in charge of Eugene Coste, an engineer of repute, while the drilling will be in charge of Mr. Gun-ter, who has been doing the gas drill-ing at Edmonton. Both gentlemen were in town on Saturday. About a year and a half ago Mr. Coste made a test of the gas well at the west end of the town. Mayor Foster, on be-half of the city, suggested to Mr. Coste that one of the shallow gas wells, 700 feet, was at his disposal, if he considered it any advantage to use that much drilling. He con-siders, however, that it will be neces-sary to start drilling a fourteen inch hole, and work down smaller from that diameter. The well will be drilled on Bull's Head creek, about three miles from Medicine Hat.

STAGE ROAD Through Mountains Near Great Falls May Be Built by Great Northern Road.

Special to The Evening Times. Great Falls, Montana, July 28.—It is possible that a stage road through the mountains above Lake McDonald will be built by the Great Northern, in order to make the magnificent scenery more accessible. If the road is built on the lines under considera-tion, it would run from Belton to the foot of the lake, probably up the east side of the lake, and then by a route that would be the most practical, across to the St. Mary's lake country, on the east side of the range, and on to Midvale. W. J. Hilligoes, a cruiser in the employ of the Great Northern, left Belton last week with a pack train to go over the proposed road and see what he could find. He said that if he could find a practical route, where the expense of building the road would not be too great the rail-road company would build it. Such a road would open to sight-seers some magnificent scenery that is now inaccessible to any one who is not willing to take a long and hard trip to reach it. The Great North-ern could offer to its tourist travel the attraction of a stage ride be-tween Belton and Midvale through some of the most wild and rugged mountain passes on the continent. Last year a trail for horses was opened nearly across the mountains, and the trip can be made on horseback, but very few persons will take it that way. Those who do, however, are well rewarded for the exertion. If the road contemplated is built, it will give a trip the like of which is not to be found elsewhere in Ameri-ca.

FRICITION AT BRANDON.

W. J. Cowan Ordered to Stop Work on Brandon and Regina Air Line. Special to The Evening Times. Winnipeg, July 28.—Owing to some friction between the Brandon city council and the C. N. R., regarding the entry of that company into the city, W. J. Cowan, who is the con-tractor in charge of the work on the C. N. R. line between Brandon and Regina, has been ordered by his em-ployers to abandon the work for the time being, until the matter is straightened out. Mr. Cowan had completed the line ten miles out of the city and had returned to finish up the work in the city, but was en-gaged only a few days when he re-ceived the notification to cease opera-tions at once. When seen at the Free Press Tuesday evening, Mr. Cowan knew nothing of the cause of the deadlock, but judged it to be a matter relating to crossings in the city. He stated that the trouble meant a serious loss to him, but that he would immediately transfer to the Hartney line, which he is under contract to complete. Mr. Cowan had 80 teams and 150 men at work in the vicinity of Brandon. Be-sides these he has 500 men engaged on the Hudson's Bay line from Etotimani north to the Pas mission, a distance of 100 miles. The 56 miles on the Oakland extension, from Oak-land to Delta on Lake Manitoba is being rushed to completion.


