LIGHTHOUSE REPAIR SHOP.

Little Staten Island Building Where Delicate Machinery is Made.

In the reservation of the lighthouse department at St. George, S. I., says the New York Press, there is an ugly three-story building of brick that is the "department store" of the lighthouse service in this country and its foreign possessions. Practically everything in the nature of a mechanical device used in the service, from the lightest lantern to the smallest order of light, and including the apparatus for blowing for signals and making the lights flash on gas buoys, are turned out in this place, and not only sent to all the stations in this district, which includes Puerto Rico, but also as far away as Alaska, and even to the Philippines.

The mechanics employed are all men of the highest grade, for the objects they are at work on are too delicate as a rule, to allow of much machine labor, and in addition to this the government has never seen fit to spend sufficient money on the plant to fit it out with such machinery. In a stroll through the workrooms one can see men turning out the delicate brass work that keeps the flashlights on a gas buoy going for three months at a time, the curious brass cylinders that make the wailing cry of a fog siren, tiny floating stops that serve to keep the oil from overflowing in the lamps after the manner of a student lamp, and the clockwork that keeps revolving lights turning round hour after hour through the long nights.

The only thing they don't make in this department store are the lenses, which are imported from Paris or London. These are "assembled" in these shops, however, and one can see lanterns of all sizes in the course of preparation, from the smallest size used in the service to ones of the power sufficient to go in lighthouse of the first order. Of course the department has to be ready for emergencies in the way of breakdowns of lights, as well as of lightships, and so they not only keep two light vessels at the wharf always ready for instant service, but they also have in this storehouse an emergency light that can be put up anywhere and fitted to take the place of any light of any description, whether it be fixed or revolving, red and white or all red.

MATERIAL FOR MUSIC STRINGS. Source of Supply - Great Amount Required to Meet Demand.

"One of the most generally accepted but mistaken ideas that is entertained by the people of this country," said S. R. Huyett, American traveling representative of a foreign manufacturer of gut. If that were true, the cats in this al. "is that strings used on musical instruments are manufactured from catgut. If that were true, the cats in this world would have been exterminated years ago in supplying the demand for strings.

"The fact is that they are manufactured from the intestines of sheep, and in obtaining enough raw material even from these animals the manufacturers at times find difficulty.

"The only string made from the intestines of the feline is that used for surgical purposes - for sewing up wounds. One would be amazed to know that there are millions of musical instrument strings used in North America alone, and just to think where the tabbies would be if they had to supply the consumption.

"Another amazing thing is that there are over 700 different grades of musical instrument strings. The demand for strings in North America is increasing every year especially in the south and in Mexico. There are more guitar strings in Mexico than any other kind, but through the south the banjo string still holds its own, despite the fact that every year has marked the slight but gradual falling off in the demand. The harp is becoming more popular, and there is a good demand for strings for this instrument.
