In the affidavit, he states that she has not been in her right health or frame of mind for more than six months past during which time she has been treated by private physicians.

About the first of the year she was taken to Hot Springs, Ark., where she was treated by specialists but to no avail. She was brought home again and has been under the care of physicians who recently recommended that she be sent to Jamestown to be treated at the state institution.
