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TRAIN NO. 5 DERAILED EARLY THIS MORNING

Every Coach But One in the Ditch—Passengers Not Seriously Injured.

Great Northern Train No. 5, which left St. Paul at 10:10 last night and which was due to arrive in Grand Forks this morning at 8:05, did not reach here until late this afternoon, due to a wreck near Barnesville, Minn. at 4:20 o'clock this morning.

A dispatch to the Evening Times from Barnesville says: "West bound train No. 5, leaving St. Paul last night, went into the ditch one-half mile east of Barnesville this morning about 4 o'clock. The entire train of seven cars, excepting one sleeper, was derailed.

The passengers were badly shaken up and a few were cut by glass. E. J. Lander and wife of Grand Forks were on the train but were uninjured.

The cause of the accident was the spreading of a rail near a switch just beyond the city limits. The train was moving about 18 to 20 miles an hour at the time. None of the coaches overturned though several are badly careened."

New equipment was made up at Crookston and sent to Barnesville and at noon the delayed passengers were started westward again.

The tracks will be cleared by this evening.

WITHDRAWS CHARGE AGAINST WIFE

Charles Witham Returns from Fargo—Sterling to be Prosecuted.

Charles Witham returned last night from Fargo where yesterday afternoon he caused the arrest of his wife and Sterling, with whom she had eloped. Sterling is now lying in the county jail at Moorhead awaiting his trial, which will be called the 20th of the month. Mr. Witham has preferred a charge of adultery against her, but has withdrawn all charges against her wife who is now staying at the home of a friend at Moorhead. The penalty for adultery in Minnesota is two years in jail and yesterday Sterling told his jailer that two years was short, but when it was over he would fix Witham.

Mr. Witham said this afternoon that he would apply for a divorce immediately and then the girl could do as she pleased. It has developed since the arrest that the man Sterling already has a wife living in Minneapolis, and it is very probable that other charges will be brought against him.

In reporting the case the Herald reporter scored Mr. Witham, stating that friends reported that his wife was almost driven out of the home.

Mr. Witham is employed as a pressman on the Evening Times and has at all times proved a competent and steady workman. His friends sympathize deeply with him in his trouble.

G. N. BUYS FIFTY CARS OF PAVING

And Will Pave Streets in the Vicinity of the New Freight House.

The Great Northern has received about ten car loads of paving stone which will be used in building a pavement around the new freight depot. The blocks are 6x6x8 inches and of a semi-firm formation making them very hard. They lie close together in the pavement and make one of the best for carrying heavy loads that can be built. The pavement which will be constructed around the depot will require about fifty car loads of material.

On the north side of the building the space between the building and the curbing of the avenue will be paved, as this will be the place where the freight will be delivered. It is probable that the same character of pavement will be constructed entirely across the depot and on the other portions of the street which will be used in delivering and receiving freight from the public. The plan of the company is to have the portion of the streets around the depot so that they can be used at all times without the delay of other vehicles getting buried in the mud.

MISSISSIPPI VETS.

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 12.—The annual reunion of the Mississippi division of the United Confederate Veterans opened in Jackson today with a large representation of delegates from the camps throughout the state. It is conceded that the reunion will be one of the most successful ever held by the state organization. Never in the history of this city have such elaborate preparations been made for the reception and entertainment of people from abroad as were made for this occasion. The praise of Commander Lowry and other prominent visitors attests the success of the efforts of the local committees. The reunion will be in session until Friday. The erection of a memorial to Southern women and building of monuments to confederate soldiers at every county seat in the state is the most important subject for discussion. Vicksburg is making a strong bid for the reunion of next year.
